

Nigel di Castiglione - Team Rector Giving up or giving out?

When I was a curate a parishioner told me on Ash Wednesday 'I'm giving up church for Lent!' I was so surprised I said nothing.

She did stay away from church for the next 5 weeks but, thankfully she was back at Easter.

Many of us have a rather negative view of Lent. We try to give up chocolate, drinking alcohol, watching TV or whatever and try to feel virtuous for having done so. If that is your current challenge don't let me discourage you; but for others - reading this in the middle of Lent why don't we think of taking something on instead?

The Bible tells us the first Lent was when Jesus took on consciously following the leading and prompting of the Holy Spirit. Many of us might ask" What does that look like?" One of the best descriptions I know is from a fellow church leader who speaks of us 'taking note of the whispers of God'.

I remember – may be 20+ years ago - thinking to myself I really must pop in and see Jack ... then deciding I was too busy that day so no I would do that tomorrow. The following morning the phone rang – it was a Funeral Director to say: 'Jack died during the night; will you take his funeral?' I had heard the whisper of God but dismissed it as something no more than a random thought and could wait. I learned a sobering lesson that day.

One of the growing scourges of modern society is loneliness. It is mentioned in the tabloids and featured in news bulletins more often than we realise. In truth it is something we can all do something about - taking a few minutes to pop in on a neighbour, picking up the phone to someone we know is housebound, making the effort to put ourselves out just a little bit. It is the sort of thing that will make a huge difference and may well be a 'whisper from God' and matter far more than giving up something that really is insignificant in comparison.

I think this sort of response is especially important living in villages as we do - where transport links are more irregular and those who are completely or largely house-bound have less people around them to be their neighbour.

Don't give up; agree to give out instead!

"Come with rain, O loud Southwester!
Bring the singer, bring the nester;
Give the buried flower a dream;
Make the settled snowbank steam;"

Hello to everyone once again. The above lines by my favoured Robert Frost reminds us that we are now approaching spring with all the expectancy that goes with this time of year. However, as I'm writing we are in the grip of the "beast from the east" and the view from my study window is filled with snow. Spring suddenly seems a long way off again. Our allotments, already wet and boggy, are now lying under a layer of snow which as it melts will add to the water that lies not too far below the surface in parts of my plot. So, for the time being it's back to dreaming and planning for the year to come. There's still a lot of tidying and repairs to carry out, but it's much more interesting to think of what I'm going to plant this year. Are they going to be old favourites, tried and tested or shall I be more adventurous and go for things I haven't grown before? Decisions,



decisions! I'm planning to put in some new strawberry plants to replace the old ones that didn't do so well last year. Other gardeners tell me it's best to replace them every 5 years or so. So which ones to use – there's such a wide choice these days. Before that I need to choose what potatoes to plant. I usually plant first earlies, salad potato's and maincrop. I'll probably stick with reds for my maincrop as they have done well in the past but I'm undecided as to the other's.

But before any of that I need to clear out the remnants of my winter veg. They did me well over the winter giving me a steady supply of kale, sprouts, cabbage and parsnips. At the moment the wet ground makes it impossible to do that, so for now it's back to dreaming and planning.

Welcome to my second parish newsletter of the year it's been another busy month! Some of the most productive

local meetings I held this month have been with the Whippet bus company, Royal Papworth and Addenbrooke's hospitals, the County Council and Greater Cambridge Partnership. It all started with a meeting with Whippet to discuss concerns about the reliability of the X3 bus which serves Papworth, Cambourne and the surrounding area. Whippet reassured me that the issues of reliability passengers experienced towards the end of last year had been resolved. But they also indicated that the service costs more to run than the revenue it generates, so it is vital people use the service to ensure its future.

As Royal Papworth will be relocated to the Addenbrooke's campus later in the year, I figured there must be some kind of win win situation possible. Staff will need to get to the campus and the bus needs more customers! A second meeting with all affected parties saw us develop this proposal further and I'd like to say thank you to everyone involved for working with such a clear and open sense of partnership. I'll keep you updated with progress, but I'm hoping we can build a more resilient X3 service and help the Royal Papworth hospital too.

Last month saw the Ministry of Justice launch a consultation on the closure of Cambridge Magistrates' Court. The consultation proposes that the work of the Court would be transferred to Cambridge County Court, Huntingdon Law Courts, Peterborough Magistrates' Court or Cambridge Crown Court. The consultation revealed that Cambridge Magistrates' Court sat for 2,376 hours out of a possible 7,620 hours in 2016/17. I have written to the Ministry of Justice to raise some questions about the consultation. My mission to visit all schools in South Cambs continued in January with visits to Abbey College, Cambridge (pictured), Cambridge Academy for Science and Technology, Melbourn Village College, Meridian Primary School, Comberton and Monkfield Park Primary School in Cambourne.

It certainly keeps me on my toes, taking challenging

questions from students! This month, a theme for many visits has been the 100th anniversary of women gaining the vote. Over the course of the centenary 489 women have been elected to the House of Commons and at the last election, 32% of MPs elected were women. However, given that all the women elected in the last hundred years would

STILL not fill the House shows there is more do. A step in the right direction is for young people to understand not only how our democracy works but that they own it. As I said to the women under and postgraduates at Murray Edwards College – don't think change is someone else's job. If you care about something, you can have a powerful role in making it happen.

At the beginning of January, I was pleased to be invited to speak at the Allyance Mental Health Conference kindly hosted by St John's College in Cambridge. The conference provided workshops for 200 nine and ten year olds from local primary schools. We hear only too often how young people can face challenges with their mental health so this conference offered children a safe environment in which they could talk about the feelings, seek support and equip themselves with practical skills. My particular thanks to Ann Jones and Jenny Jones for arranging this first class event.

As the A14 upgrade continues apace, I coordinated a meeting with Highways England and a number of landowners who are affected by the project. I appreciate the work has been causing some difficulties for residents in some of the neighbouring villages (including rat running through my own village of Elsworth!) As such, I will hold future meetings with Highways England to monitor progress and issues - please do keep an eye on my website where I post a weekly update on the work being undertaken in our area.

Although my newsletter deliberately tends to focus on local issues, I continue to be busy on national issues in Parliament too. This month has seen me raise a range of matters from questioning the bosses of Carillion about the collapse of the company to speaking in the House about the Government's welcome changes to Personal Independent Payment awards for people with mental health conditions.

I also asked the Prime Minister about pay for "live in" care sector staff, who often look after vulnerable disabled adults. There has been some confusion about the impact of the national minimum wage on staff who sleep on site as part of their work. The Prime Minister has agreed to meet me to discuss these concerns and I am hopeful that we can find a way forward.

The above is a brief snap-shot of my work at Westminster but my website is regularly updated with more information and topics. If you have concerns or views about a local or national issue, please do call in to one of my surgeries.

My next surgery will be on 3rd March 10am–12pm at Caldecote Primary School, Highfields Road, Caldecote, CB23 7NX. All are welcome, so I run a "no appointment necessary" system.

At the beginning of the war many young men in the cities enlisted because they would get three good meals a day and be paid! As the war took its course the quality of the meals deteriorated because of numerous difficulties. Although the conditions were horrific there were honourable moments. Because each side ate breakfast and the evening meal at roughly the same time, there was a gentleman's agreement not to shoot the men on your opponent's side who were carrying the food from the cookhouses at the rear of the lines to the front - and this distance could be something like 5 miles. It was most interesting to learn about a little discussed aspect of being in the trenches.






On 12 February 1918, 17 patients arrived at Papworth Hall, 13 miles outside Cambridge, many discharged soldiers from the battlefields of France and Belgium. During the First World War cases of tuberculosis surged and the chronic infectious disease killed thousands of people each year. In 1915, for instance, more than 41,000 people died of TB in the UK.

The Cambridgeshire
Tuberculosis Colony – as
the hospital was then known
– was Cambridgeshire TB
officer Dr Pendrill VarrierJones' experimental scheme,
relocated to the village of
Papworth Everard from
nearby Bourn following a
donation of £5,000 from a
wealthy philanthropist.

The move to the Papworth Hall estate realised his vision for a long-term approach to solving what he called the 'aftercare problem'. He developed the concept of an industrial colony to treat, house and employ patients and their families.

In the earliest news story on record about the colony – in The Cambridge Chronicle and University Journal – a journalist recounted: "I made my first acquaintance with a patient, an unfortunate who voluntarily enlisted at the outbreak of the war and had broken down in training with tuberculosis. His open-air bedroom looked almost cosy, although the thermometer [was] at freezing point."

Fresh air and light work were believed to be central to recovery – even in winter - and one of the early photographs shows TB patients' beds pushed on to one of the hospital's balconies.

Other early TB treatments were not so gentle and focused on collapsing the lung, with doctors believing that the diseased lobe would heal quicker by resting it. Sometimes the lung was collapsed using ping pong balls placed in a cavity under the ribs (plombage), and sometimes by removing ribs from the chest wall (thoracoplasty).

In 1929 the colony was renamed the Papworth Village Settlement, and in 1948 the treatment blocks were passed to the National Health Service and the facility began to expand its services and develop expertise in other areas of chest medicine under the name Papworth Hospital. The hospital building itself continued to expand on the site around the hall.

Former TB patient David Coles, 86, spent time convalescing in one of the iconic Papworth 'TB huts'. "They were basically wooden boxes with a door and flaps," he said. "And they had the doors and the flaps open all day long – no matter what time of year. It was very cold and there was nothing to do unless you had your own wireless with you."

Mr Coles was diagnosed with TB at the age of 19 during his National Service medical examination in 1948. After antibiotics cured the disease, he underwent lobectomy surgery at Papworth Hospital to treat the damage it had caused. The tops of both his lungs were removed in two separate operations, one in 1961 and the other in 1966.

"They were a bit worried about the second operation. I saw the surgeon, Mr [Christopher] Parish and I told him I might as well



be dead as living with the haemorrhaging I was having.


"Later that afternoon he popped his head round the door and held his thumbs up. He said: 'David, I'm going to do you tomorrow.' And the next day I had the surgery and sailed through it. Chest-wise, I've never looked back."

Professor John Wallwork CBE, Chairman of Royal Papworth Hospital NHS Foundation Trust, said: "As surgery started to be used as a treatment for TB, hospitals like Papworth attracted chest surgeons to come and work here, and over time they moved into other types of heart and lung surgery, for example transplantation.

"Once we started performing UK and world 'firsts' at Papworth – like the first successful heart transplant in the UK in 1979 and the world's first heart, lung and liver transplant in 1986 - we became known all over the world. This helped us to attract more worldclass doctors and develop specialist services in not just transplantation, but also the treatment of pulmonary hypertension, cystic fibrosis and sleep disorders."

Stephen Posey, CEO of Royal Papworth Hospital NHS Foundation Trust. said: "The same pioneering spirit with which Pendrill Varrier-Jones established the hospital 100 years ago continues to inspire breakthroughs in patient care and treatment today. Royal Papworth Hospital has grown from a Cambridgeshire TB colony into a globally-recognised heart and lung centre that is now preparing to move to a new purpose-built site in Cambridge later this year - the next chapter in our compelling story."

The new hospital, which will open on Cambridge's Biomedical Campus in September 2018, was designed with the help of



clinicians and with Royal Papworth Hospital's patients in mind. In addition to 240 inpatient beds in single, en suite rooms, plus 46 beds in critical care and a separate day case facility, there will be five state-of-the-art theatres, five cath labs and two hybrid theatres.

'Papworth 100' events and activities are planned throughout the year to celebrate Royal Papworth Hospital's centenary, including a summer fete, an appearance at the Cambridge Science Festival and screenings of a new film which explores the hospital's history.

Royal Papworth Hospital has received £88,900 from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for the Papworth 100 project. Made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, the project will celebrate the centenary and remarkable history of Royal Papworth Hospital in 2018.



At the latest safety inspection, issues were identified with two of the items of play equipment.

Summer Paddling Pool Attendants

There were maths lessons to scootering lessons(yes that is how to ride a scooter). At lunchtime there were children helping in the lunch hall and on the playground helping to referee the football.


During celebration assembly, Kieran, Gabriel and a group of Year 4 girls helped to give out certificates and birthday stickers.
