Just a reminder that the Parish Council will be holding its Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 22nd May at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. The meeting is open to all residents of the Village and is a chance to hear what the Parish Council has been up to over the last year, plans for the coming year and for electors to have their say on anything which they consider is important to the people of the parish.

The Parish Council currently has 9 Councillors but still has vacancies for 4 more to bring us up to the full complement of 13

If you have a real interest in the village or are new to the village and want to get more involved why not come along to the meeting and stop to chat with one or more of our Councillors and see if it's for you?

We're looking for people who can rise to the challenge and make a commitment to improving the quality of life for everybody in our village, no matter what your age or experience.

Knowledge and previous experience aren't essential, training is available and existing members have a wealth of experience they are willing to share. The essential element is enthusiasm and a willingness to work as a member of our team to make a difference to our village.

We hold 11 Parish Council meetings per year and in addition you will be required to become a member of one or more of our sub-committees and will be able to get involved in working groups looking at specific projects if you wish.

Village Design Statement

Since mid-2018, a group of Parish Councillors, village residents and consultants employed by South Cambs District Council have been working together as part of a project, along with 7 other villages, to develop Village Design Statements.

The purpose of this project, funded by central Government was to raise the quality of new planned development and support inclusive, sustainable growth. The new Village Design Guides will, once adopted, be material planning considerations as Supplementary Planning Documents (SPDs).

A Village Design Guide describes the distinctive character of the village and sets out guidelines for how this should be enhanced by new developments. The statements will show how buildings, streets, spaces, landscape and materials come together to create areas with distinctive identity and character.

The idea of the process is to ensure any new development is responsive to the character of the community that it is adding to, and enhances it. The documents will help communities express what is important to them about the visual character of their village, provide clarity for developers on design issues, and enable Council planners to push for high quality design.

It helps communities and planners shape the character of new development in your area, in response to community priorities. It is a way to provide more locally specific detail, which augments and amplifies our Local Plan policies.

The new Village Design Statements are now available for comment during a six week public consultation. SCDC - Additional Green Bins

South Cambs District Council have recently updated their policy for householders with an additional green refuse bin.

Every household in South Cambridgeshire is entitled to one green bin for food and garden waste, which is collected fortnightly from March to November and monthly from December to February. You can also pay to have up to a further three green bins, which will be emptied along with your first green bin.

The new fees for extra green bins are:

£20 from 1 April 2019 to 30 September 2019 for each additional bin

£35 from 1 October 2019 for each additional bin

SCDC have communicated directly with residents who already have additional green bins to arrange payment and issue a permit **WHICH MUST BE DISPLAYED** on the bin.

If you are yet to receive information from SCDC please contact them refuse@scambs.gov.uk or on 03450 450 063. Additional bins which do not display a permit will not be emptied.

Anyone who now orders an additional green bin is automatically asked to pay for the permit at the time of ordering.

Nigel di Castiglione - Team Rector There is more!

All of us are deeply thankful for the skill of the medics around us; some of us may wish we didn't need their help as often as we do. As a result, we may be inclined to think that good health is a gift, some have more of it than others; and often it may seem there's not much any of us can do to change where we sit on the spectrum of health and sickness.

There are accounts in the Bible describing where Jesus brings spontaneous and supernatural healing to sick people

but - assuming we can believe what is written – many people conclude that was then and things are not like that anymore. But is that right?

In one of the later letters (often called 'epistles') towards the end of the Bible the author , James, encourages Christian readers who are unwell and not recovering to seek out those who are seemingly 'older and wiser' in the faith, to bring the power of their faith to bear on the prevailing illness. People being healed above and beyond what the doctors can do for us was something that was experienced after Jesus' time on earth had come to an end; through the agency of the local church. It remains true today, in the experience and testimony of millions around the world.

A few weeks ago, I witnessed someone who (following a car accident) has known chronic pain constantly for more than 25 years get healed in a matter of minutes when she asked Christians to stand before God with her. This was not unexpected for me; I have seen this sort of diving intervention before. It is exciting. I believe it is part and parcel of normal people discovering God's norm for us on earth is what is normal around him in heaven.

In a prayer - written down for our benefit in another 'epistle'- one of the great Christians of the first century prays his readers will experience '... the immeasurable greatness of his power toward us who believe, according to the working of his great might that he worked in Christ when he raised him from the dead ...' He means us to understand Christians can expect to have at their disposal God's power on a par with that which brought about the resurrection of Jesus.

Christians all over the world believe the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, on Easter Day nearly 2,000 years ago, was a reliable historical event. He was dead and then on the third day was raised to life. Of course, this is a big subject and I have not tried to answer the many questions some will have on the matter. My hope is that all of us will come to look for more and start to expect more of God in our lives. We will never fully understand nor have answers to all our questions; if we did there would be no room for faith. Nevertheless, let me encourage you to let curiosity overcome doubts and previous disappointments - on the premise that God is utterly and unfailingly good and there is more of His power for us to find than we may have previously expected.



Spring has Sprung at Pendragon School

The Spring has brought lots of new life to Pendragon Primary School. In just one month the school field has had a spring makeover with the planting of 10 new trees, the sowing of a wildflower meadow and the installation of a willow tunnel.

It is all thanks to a £3000 grant which we applied for last summer from Cambridge water. The fund has biodiversity at its heart and awarded to projects that are aiming to develop habitat opportunities for local wildlife. Our new attributes will hopefully tick lots of biodiversity boxes and in addition provide us with some much needed shade on our field.

The fund was brought to our attention by Victoria Chapman from our Friends Committee; she approached us to see if we would be interested, we came up with a wish list and she kindly filled in the application form for us. We could not have done this without her support.

The support has continued from our community with a group of parents and grandparents, past and present, friends and colleagues generously giving up their time to help us to rake and dig to prepare the wildflower seed meadow for seeding and lend a hand to the willow sculptor in the creation of the 3m tunnel. So, a huge thank you goes out to everyone who helped out, and special thanks to Liv Myson who helped to co-ordinate the volunteers.

March the 12th saw the installation of 10, three metre high trees to our site curtesy of Barcham trees. The excitement reached fever pitch for some of our pupils when they saw the mini digger that was brought in to prepare the holes for the new trees. Most classes came out to watch at some point across the morning and witness the occasion.

The team worked tirelessly to get the trees in in just a few hours and even lent a hand to remove some large plants from another area of the site to enable us to complete our next planned project of a sensory garden.

Small groups of children joined me and Miss Kate that day to begin the task of raking the ground for sowing the wildflowers seed.

The children are now keen tree and willow waterers and have a rota to help us to keep the trees watered and enable them to spread their roots in their new home.

Just a week later our tunnel was installed and, despite losing our planned volunteers at

short notice, our amazing Friend Committee stepped up to the challenge and joined us across the day in small groups to rake and weave. It was a great community atmosphere!

Our final tasks are to barrow some bark to the willow tunnel and the dome, give our environmental area, called The Haven, a much need trim and create a seating area in the middle.

Heidi Allen Member of Parliament for South Cambridgeshire

Since my last newsletter, the twists and turns in the Brexit debate have continued apace. The Prime Minister's withdrawal agreement was rejected by Parliament for a second time, Article 50 has been extended (briefly) and MPs have finally been allowed to

express their own views on a range of possible outcomes, having originally been denied that opportunity. By the time you read this, the situation will have inevitably changed again! Although limited space prevents me from providing a more detailed explanation here, I have been providing rolling updates on my website so that constituents are up to date at all times – especially about the votes I am casting on their behalf. If you have not already taken a look, please do take a minute to have a look at the updates – www. heidiallen.co.uk

By way of headlines, I will never support "no deal," I don't believe the Prime Minister's negotiated deal is good enough and I will continue to support my constituents having the final say on any deal, versus remaining in the EU.

I know the votes I cast will not always meet with universal approval, but I give you my assurance that I will exercise my duties with the utmost seriousness and always act in the best interests of my constituents and country throughout these turbulent times.

Away from Brexit, there's still the day job to do as I continue to focus on issues affecting South Cambridgeshire. I know that many communities are concerned about hare coursing and its devastating impact. On the 5th March, I met with the Prime Minister's Special Advisor on Environment, Lord Randall, to make the case for new and improved legislation to deal with this scourge. Along with the Police and Crime Commissioner and Superintendent James Sutherland, I outlined my concerns that hare coursing was not only increasing but that the measures for dealing with it had ceased to be effective.

Lord Randall agreed to look for legislative and other opportunities to bring about change, including the possibility of sentencing guidelines for courts and increasing the penalties available to them.

Cambridgeshire Police has a dedicated Rural Crime Action Team which does an excellent job but it is clear that both the police and the courts lack the powers to deal with hare coursing.

The police are having to rely on legislation from the nineteenth century to bring prosecutions and without sentencing guidelines for the courts and increased penalties, all too often the legislation does not provide an effective deterrent. I was pleased that Lord Randall was so prepared to listen to our concerns and work with us to bring an end to hare coursing and the increased levels of crime associated with it.



I am determined to bring about the positive change that is needed and I will provide an update in future newsletters. Earlier this month, I visited Long Road Sixth Form (pictured) and Cambridge Academy of Science and Technology to talk about my role as an MP.

It's fair to say that I was kept on my toes by a demanding audience! I answered questions about my decision to leave the Conservative Party, Brexit (of course!), how to heal divisions in society, education funding, Donald Trump and the possible outcome of the next general election....to name but a few!

From sixth form students to our youngest pupils, I was particularly moved by the story of five year old George, who has been leading the fight against litter in Duxford and gathering litter whilst donning a superhero cape!



I was so inspired by his commitment to the local environment that I joined him and other residents of Duxford for some litter picking one Saturday morning.

George is a great reminder of how local action on the ground can bring about positive change in our villages – well done George!

What a glorious Easter weekend! The sunshine usually brings a smile to faces, a lightening of mood, and sometimes the setting of a resolve to get on with things that may have seemed a bridge too far during the more gloomy days. Members of the Papworth Craft Group turned out in force during March. Two tables were fully occupied, even on the Easter weekend. Everyone seems to be putting in the hours between the two meetings. The patchwork quilt is growing at an amazing speed. -It is being worked with a very attractive mix of colours and patterns. As it grows, it seems to alter its appearance, as the parts mix together creating a constantly evolving whole. Everyone is looking forward to seeing the quilt, when it reveals itself once all sections are joined. For the time being, it can be admired twice a month – and the reveal is different on each occasion.
