Paddling Pool & Play Area

The school summer holidays are upon us, and it's great to see lots of families making use of the padding pool and play area in the village.

The paddling pool opened for the summer as planned on Sunday 21st July and is scheduled to be open until the weekend of 7th/8th September. A big thank you to Mark, Paul and Luke for all their hard work cleaning and preparing the pool ready for use.

As in previous years, two temporary toilets have been sited at the play area for convenience, plus, this year we have also provided a disabled access toilet with baby change facility. The toilets are emptied and serviced a minimum of twice a week and checked daily.

The pool is maintained regularly throughout the day – but please help us to keep the pool as clean as possible for everyone to enjoy.

Do not allow children covered in mud and dirt to go in the pool – dirt and silt can easily block the filters.

Please could we also request that children do not eat food whilst in the pool or in the area immediately round the poolside and that all food scraps are disposed of and not allowed to get into the water as food debris can easily block the pool filters.

We would like to thank Adrian, Eddie, Edward and Ofek who have stepped up to maintain the pool and who are doing a sterling job in ensuring the paddling pool and surrounding area is kept clean and tidy and safe to use.

With the high numbers of people using the paddling pool a huge amount of rubbish is generated.

Please take your rubbish home with you whenever possible, including food scraps and soiled nappies, and use the rubbish bins at the play area for general litter only.

The paddling pool attracts families from far and wide, many of who travel by car which can create parking problems on Ermine Street North, Chequers Lane and Varrier Jones Drive.

If you are visiting the paddling pool why not leave the car at home and walk?

We would request that people who do drive, park with consideration for other motorists, do not cause an obstruction and park within the rules of the Highway Code.


Papworth to Cambourne

(Caxton Gibbet) Cycle Path update

The following information has been provide by Cambridgeshire County Council's Highways Department:

- New path to be constructed on the east side on highway verge extending from the roundabout to the south of Papworth Everard to link to the path on the north side of the A428 at Caxton Gibbet, hence providing a link from Papworth through to Cambourne.
- Funding for the new path has been confirmed: some from Highways England and some from Cambridgeshire County Council
- Three culverts will need to be extended to accommodate the width of the path.
- · British Telecom poles have already been relocated.
- · The width of the path will vary depending on the width of verge

available. This will generally be 3.5 metres wide. A typical cross section would be:



- It is hoped that work can commence in the Autumn, but this is subject to agreeing a cost with our contractor, and the interface with current A14 works (as the A1198 is on their diversion route).
- The traffic management arrangements, programme and working hours are still to be agreed, but it is likely that two way traffic signals will be in place operating 9.30-15.30 Monday to Friday for several months.

We don't know what we've got . . .

... until it's gone!

Waking to discover the water supply to the whole village has been cut off was a shock. Because this was the result of an unexpected burst main there was no time to prepare; but to find workers repairing the problem was another reminder of how much we take for granted. Losing our water supply happens rarely, in this country; but for many around the world it is a common affliction. just another thing to cope with on a regular basis.

There is a principle worth grasping: choosing to be thankful rather than nurturing a sense of entitlement can be a key to transforming our outlook, culture, the attractiveness of a locality and the impact of our lives.

Thankfulness is a mindset that fosters generosity which strengthens community and reduces isolation. Thankfulness is the reaction which will prompt others to offer help when needs become known; because it drives the conclusion that your problem is my opportunity to lend a hand and become part of the solution.

The news the school had to be closed and some businesses could not open today due the absence of a water supply will have put hundreds of people to immediate inconvenience; but it is marvellous, with so much technology built into our lives, many will have found this out before arriving at the school gates or having driven miles only to find a "closed today" sign hanging on the door. It is when we can be thankful for the small things, we are starting to make headway towards thankfulness as a hallmark of who we are.

The summer months can be a time for holidays, changes in the regular routines and (dare I suggest) a bit more time to take stock of just how well-resourced many of us are. Let's make this summer a time to reflect, make choices about how we will become more generous, more community-minded, more aware of when where we can lend a hand and how we can be part of making a difference. The impact can be to the benefit of my neighbour, the community I live or work in; it may even ripple out globally when I decide to get involved in an overseas project we are aware of.

One of the greatest miracles Jesus did is known as the 'Feeding of the 5,000'. He was given 5 simple loaves and a couple of fish. We read he gave thanks and the miracle of multiplication happened as the distribution was made. The challenge is not so much understanding how, but to discover God's goodness is released through thankful people.








The Daily Mail has recently been highlighting the issue of homes being sold to cover the cost of Care Home Fees. There have been some horrendous stories, and the additional pain that has been caused for relatives who are seeing their loved ones so distressed about their home being sold. On July 20th in the Saturday Mail we had the story headed "My nan spent her last days terrified she'd have to sell her home" Countless people have been forced to sell up, and it seems grossly unfair that it is only when a person has £23,500 or less that the local council will start to meet the cost of care. It has also been highlighted that council's pay far less than individuals for exactly the same care.

It is estimated that around 33% of us will end up in a Care Home as we live longer and longer, and the present system is a scandal, but that is what we are having to work with. As my daughter once said "What is the point in buying a house and saving Dad, if at the end of the day, the Council take it all if we have to go into a Care Home"

However, if you plan well ahead then you can protect your house and assets being taken to pay for care. This can be done with a Asset Protection Trust Will, and for a couple costs less than one weeks Care Home fees. It is a way of protecting 50% of your main asset your house, from being taken.

Alternatively you can set up a Family Protection Trust, although this must not be done solely to avoid Care Home Fees (called deliberate deprivation of assets).


Butterflies at RSPB Hope Farm

At Hope Farm, we have been monitoring butterflies for almost 20 years. This gives us a measure on whether our wildlife friendly farming management is working. We look after butterflies on our farm by providing 5.4 hectares of wildflower enriched habitats (sown with Knapweed, Musk Mallow, oxeye-daisy and Vetch amongst others), and 4.3 hectares of leguminous clover based nectar resources (sown with clover, sainfoin and Lucerne-like species). This kind of management is made possible through governmental Agri-environment schemes which provide funding to farmers and land managers to farm in a way that supports biodiversity, enhances the landscape, and improves the quality of water, air and soil. The flower rich habitats, together with other sympathetic management techniques for farmland invertebrates have helped the wildlife at Hope Farm, like on other wildlife-friendly farms, soar!

Derek conducts weekly surveys which run from April to September, to see how our butterfly numbers have changed. It provides a wonderful insight into the butterfly populations and how they have responded to our habitat management. Our data is included in the UK's national butterfly monitoring scheme where butterfly trends are recorded from over 2000 sites.

Over the past 20 years we have seen the populations of our butterflies increase by an average 223% comparing with national trends showing two thirds of the UK's butterflies are in decline over



the past 40 years. At Hope Farm, we have seen species that were either absent or scarce colonise in significant numbers, including Marbled White, Brown Argus and Common Blue.

How have our butterflies fared in 2019 so far?

We had a good start to the survey season this year, with large numbers of Orange-Tip and Brimstone recorded between mid-April and Early June (one of the reasons the national scheme records for 6 months is to include the flight period for all species) both probably benefitted from a warm Spring.

As we hit July the numbers of Meadow Browns, Ringlets and more recently Gatekeepers have dominated the survey counts and we are on target for a record year for Meadow Brown. Over the next few weeks we hope to see more Peacocks, Small Tortoiseshells and Common Blues as well as the possible forecast influx of Painted Ladies.

Our butterfly monitoring continues weekly until the end of September. I will publish the full results in a blog post on the rspb website in the Autumn once all the counts have been done and the numbers crunched.

Butterfly Conservation are inviting everyone enjoy such moments and to take just 15 minutes to connect with nature and appreciate our butterflies. By taking part in the Big Butterfly Count before the 11th August (the biggest butterfly survey in the world!) your sightings will help provide a snapshot of how well our butterflies are faring. In 2018, the survey had over 100,000 participants which is a testament to the appeal of these fascinating insects.

Member of Parliament for South Cambridgeshire

I know from my inbox that many of you share my concerns about the acute pressures on our NHS. Last month, I called a debate in Parliament to challenge the Health Minister about this and press for a much-needed increase in funding.

The level of local funding continues to fall behind funding in other areas and does not reflect the fact the Cambridgeshire is one of the fastest growing counties. The NHS funding formula has determined that our population is growing at 0.1% below England average(!?) whereas in reality growth across the county has been 0.6% above the England average for the past four years. Even putting that growth aside, our per head funding has always been too low. In Cambridgeshire, we receive £1,125 per capita, as compared with £1,244 in Bedfordshire, £1,288 in West Suffolk and £1,497 in Norfolk.

During the debate, the Minister agreed to meet me and our Clinical Commissioning Group's Chief Executive to discuss these concerns in more detail. I will of course let you know how that meeting goes.

Climate change is undoubtedly one of the greatest challenges of our time. The recent announcement committing the UK to net-zero carbon emissions, ending the UK's contribution to climate change by 2050 is welcome - but to meet this target, we all need to play our part in increasing the use of cleaner and renewable energy. So last month, I was pleased to be joined by a group of constituents who made the journey to Westminster as part of the climate change lobby. I'll be working with a cross party group of MPs to come up with some tangible targets that we'll be campaigning to have embedded in the next Queen's Speech. Committing our ambitions to the next Government's legislative programme would be without doubt the most effective way of focusing minds.

Away from Westminster, it was wonderful to play a part in officially opening Gamlingay Village Primary School, following extensive renovation and an extension to the buildings. Enthusiastically assisted by some of the children, we made light work of the ribbon cutting! This project has been a long time in the coming, but was absolutely worth the wait with the children now enjoying first class facilities. Well done to everybody involved in taking the plans from paper to building!

In further local news, the Government has re-opened the Rural Community Energy Fund - a £10 million programme to support rural communities in England to develop community-based renewable energy projects. Further details are available here: https://www.gov.uk/guidance/rural-community-energy-fund
