Well autumn is truly with us now as witnessed by the countryside all around us and within the village. A truly magnificent and beautiful sight full of colour and rich, damp, earthy smells. A busy time for us allotment holders with produce to be collected and stored or converted into produce to be consumed some later point. In the past this may have involved, drying or preserving in a variety of ways. Of course, these days we are not reliant on such things to provide us with food over the winter – the local supermarkets fulfil that role! But there are still those among us who like to try the old methods of preserving – jam and chutney making being the



most obvious. but also bottling and drying for the more adventurous. Anyone out there with recipes they would like to share? Storing produce can be a bit of a poser for some of us when faced with a glut of fruit and veg and sadly I have lost produce in the

past that I've been unable to store properly and that had no takers. An enterprising chap I once knew helped people dispose of their excess of apples which he then turned into cider – I suppose that it can just about be seen as a way of preserving!

On the site as I say much of the produce is being harvested. However, sprouts, cabbages, parsnips and other things can be left in the ground for some months to come yet to continue to provide us with a flow of freshly grown veg for the autumn and winter As the allotments are gradually cleared of their produce so begins the process of tidying up and putting the plot to bed or beginning the preparations for next year. This can be a heavy task in ground that is becoming increasingly damp, buts its all part of the rotation of the seasons that goes on without end.

To end I'd just like to remind holders about keeping your plot tidy and in good shape, not just for your own sake but for that of your neighbours on the site. We are still organising working days on the site, usually on the last Saturday of the month to help to keep the place ship-shape. Please come along and help if you can.

Finally, a word a word about security on the site – please remember to lock gates after you have used them.

The NHS Health Check is a national programme offering a health check-up every five years to adults in England aged 40 to 74 without a pre-existing cardiovascular condition. One of the largest prevention programmes of its type in the world, the programme is designed to help prevent and detect early signs of heart disease, stroke, kidney disease, type 2 diabetes and dementia.

As we get older, we have a higher risk of developing one of these conditions. An NHS Health Check helps find ways to lower the risk. If you are in the 40-74 age group without a pre-existing condition, you should have an NHS Health Check every five years.

Your GP may have written to you inviting you for your NHS Health Check. Everyone Health provide the same NHS Health Checks in the community which you can access if it is more convenient for you.

Everyone Health delivers these important checks in local, easily accessible community clinics across Cambridgeshire, you will find us in libraries, community centres, at local events, church halls, Pop up Shops in town centres- we also deliver in workplaces.

Plenty of appointments are available to suit your needs. The check takes about 20-30 minutes. You will meet with a trained professional who will check your blood pressure and cholesterol, they will record your height, weight, age, gender and ethnicity. You'll also be asked some simple questions about your family history and choices that may put your health at risk.

Once you've had your NHS Health Check, your results will be discussed with you, you'll be given personalised advice on how to maintain or improve your health, which will help you lower your risk of developing any of the conditions screened for.

Andy H, who had an NHS Health Check at our Pop up Shop in Huntingdon earlier this year was informed his Cholesterol was high and would need to visit his GP for discussion and medical advice about how this could affect him. Andy also took advice away with him from the Everyone Health practitioner about changes he could implement in the meantime to improve his health & lifestyle.

At the GP appointment after a further fasting blood test Andy's results from the NHS Health Check were confirmed and it was agreed he would return after 3 months to see if the changes in lifestyle he was implementing would improve his results enough to avoid medication. Andy returned after 3 months to find his GP happy as he confirmed his cholesterol had reduced to a healthier level and he had lost 9.1kg, meaning he would not need medication – just to continue with what he was doing!

Andy said: "Everyone Health provided a very beneficial and good service, a worthwhile visit that has turned things around for me".



Come and See!

On occasions when I complete a round of golf having won or been on a winning team the banter in the clubhouse is that I had an extra person on my side! It is a genial and respectful acknowledgement of my personal faith and professional role in the community.

Although I am not sure God's help extends to how well I drive the ball from the tee or putt out on the green, I know God is our very-present help and a very important means of strength day-by-day; to the extent I don't know how other people live well without the personal knowledge and enjoyment of God in their lives.

Even so many people acknowledge God on a daily basis, even if it is only in the form of an expletive or reaction as part of ordinary

conversation; which puts religious faith in the category of something talked about but not really taken seriously.

As the warmth of summer recedes and Autumn creeps in, we are now in the season when there are lots of opportunities, if we want to take them. to join in with your local church at services intended to help the whole community and not just today's Sunday-regulars! It starts with Harvest when we take time to acknowledge the gift of a bumper year for our farmers as their work underpins the food supply of the nation.

A few weeks later, on November 10th we hold a special service on Remembrance Sunday to acknowledge the many people who have given their lives in wars, both past and present, to secure the freedom we often take for granted. We will be joined by members of the local uniformed organisations for an Act of Remembrance at the village memorial in St Peter's Church at 10.30am before processing down for the main service being held in the Village Hall. During December our Village Carol Service will be in the Village Hall on Thursday 12th December at 6.30pm; we will have a Christingle Service in St Peter's Church at 3.00pm on the afternoon of Sunday 15th December and our much-loved Crib Service on Christmas Eve, starting at 3.00pm.

Can God only be found and known in church services? No; there are many places in the Bible that make this clear. On the other hand, I can hardly call myself a golfer if I never get my clubs out of the garage, never go to the course and never play a game with likeminded friends.

This is where my analogy breaks down; because in the end playing the game of golf is about how well I manage my use of the clubs in the conditions on the course; whereas Christianity at its best is how God finds us, comes along side and addresses the inner condition of our souls, if we will let him. I have found there is something very special about being in those places and occasions along with others when (in worship and prayer, reading the Bible and enjoying the fellowship of others) God makes known his presence with us and the availability of his resources for us. People often tell me they get a warm welcome at St Peter's Church. Please consider joining us for one of our special services; if in doubt remember we meet every Sunday at 10.30am.

A few years ago, my daughter bought for two of her brothers and me tickets for the final day of the British Open Golf Championship. I was excited to go but, being candid, I thought I might end the day thinking I could have seen more if I had stayed home and watched the day's play on TV. I was wrong! It was a wonderful experience and unlike anything I would have known or experienced just sitting in front of a screen at home.



treasured. Baby garments are very satisfying to make, as a new baby is always a special event in any family. Work at the Playing Fields

You may have noticed the site compound, porta-cabin and contractors from The Lindum Group Ltd working on the changing rooms at the playing fields.

The Parish Council is currently having the changing facilities refurbished and brought up to standard. The work includes new showers, creation of an officials' changing room, plus general refurbishment of the building to provide better facilities for the village's sporting teams. A veranda is also to be built on to the front of the building.

This work is part of a larger project on the site - to construct a single storey pavilion, create a hard surface car park plus installation of an additional floodlight and alterations to the existing boundary fencing of the tennis courts.

As part of these works the entranceway to the car park will also be widened to improve access. Unfortunately in recent weeks, a large vehicle collided with one of the brick plinths at the entrance, so for the time being the pillar has been removed to make it safe. The original King George V plaque was not damaged and has been retained to be built into the new entrance way once constructed.

Planning documents for the proposed Pavilion, car park and associated works have been submitted to South Cambs District Council Planning for approval and we are awaiting their decision. (Planning Reference S/3051/19/FL)

Overhanging Hedges & Trees

I have been asked by Cambridgeshire County Council's Highways Department to remind householders that hedges and trees should not be allowed to encroach onto the public highway.

The owner or occupier of a property has a legal responsibility (Highways Act 1980 s154) to ensure that the 'public highway' adjacent to a property is not obstructed by vegetation from their property. The public highway is defined by law as consisting of any verge, footway, bridleway or footpath that is maintained at public expense and over which the public has right of way.

Local Authorities have a legal duty to ensure that public highways are unobstructed, so usually inspect roads regularly and often receive complaints from members of the general public.

When Local Authorities become aware of such obstructions, they will usually advise the property owner or occupier of the problem. They may sometimes raise the issue with an owner/occupier even if the vegetation only overhangs the pavement/roadway by a small amount. If the owner/occupier does not take corrective action within a reasonable time (the Local Authority will normally specific a time limit for the work to be completed), the Local Authority can issue a formal notice for the work to be undertaken, and if that is ignored, they can do the work and charge the owner/occupier.

If your hedge is a bit unruly, now is the perfect time of year to get those shears and hedge trimmers out and get trimming to help keep our pathways clear and unobstructed!




RSPB Hope Farm

Round up for our Farmland Breeding Birds in 2019

A key part of the work we do at Hope Farm is to demonstrate wildlife friendly farming, in its practicalities on the ground, but also with stringent monitoring to demonstrate what a difference wildlife-friendly farming can make for nature. 2019 has been a wonderful example of what birds may return to a farm and increase in abundance when a space is made for nature to thrive.

Scores on the Doors



Monitoring for farmland birds is undertaken using the Common Bird Census. Here, surveys are walked across the farm to identify the number and distribution of territories on the farm. This graph shows the increase in the Hope Farm index by 185%, having maintained the index at the same high level for over a decade now. This year has also seen a bounce bag after a decline in 2018, that may result from the severe weather events of that season. This sits against a background decline of England's farmland bird abundance since 2000 by 20%.

Below, are the changes in territory numbers between 2000, when we took on management of the farm, and 2019. Yellow wagtail and corn bunting have returned to the farm after an absence in 2018. Goldfinch numbers have continued to increase this year, whilst reed bunting, yellow hammer, linnet and starling territory numbers are similar to previous years. Surprisingly, grey partridge has been scarce in terms of territories on the farm, although this autumn has witnessed a couple of large coveys remaining on the farm.

So what management has made the difference at Hope Farm?

Hedgerow management

It is always rewarding to see the difference that can be made for farmland birds, through provision of summer food, winter food, and nesting habitat. We have continued to manage hedgerows in a way that creates a diversity of hedge structures, and this helps to cater for a diversity of hedge nesting species. Some are

maintained as shorter 2m high and at least 2m wide structures, whilst encouraging long vegetation growth at the bottom most suited to yellowhammers and grey partridge. Other taller scrubby hedges should be better suited to turtle doves should they return, or greenfinch, with the adequate feeding habitat in nearby areas.

A few hedges have been earmarked to flail back already this autumn, where the hedges have become very tall, and have spread so far out that they come to a hard border with a track rather than having a softer border for ground nesting birds. The decline in use of these hedgerows by yellowhammers and whitethroats could well reflect this change in structure. With over 12km of hedgerows on the farm, management of 3km will still leave plenty of berries and pollinator resources in full swing for the winter and following spring next year.

In field management

Out in the field, we have managed skylark plots, lapwing plots and a corn bunting plot, funded within the Countryside Stewardship Scheme (CSS), to keep our ground nesting farmland birds as safe as we can from mammalian predators. 25 skylark plots across the farm, in every field with a winter cereal, help to maintain accessible and safe nesting habitat all the way through the breeding season. The lapwing fallow plot has also been a great success, with lapwings using the 2ha fallowed plot and surrounding areas to host 4 lapwing territories within a bean crop and on a spring barley field following a cover crop.

Summer food availability

On the farm, we do our best to make sure that birds can find food nearby suitable nesting areas. We grow 4.4ha of wildflower margins, and 4.3ha of leguminous pollen and nectar rich areas, to ensure plenty of flower rich resources on farm. These areas are a fantastic resource for pollinators and natural enemies to insect pests in the crop, helping us to farm, but also resulting in more chick food! Seed resources are important for species like linnet using the oilseed rape in the rotation, but also for turtle doves where we grow and spread some seed through the summer, ready for their hopeful return.

Insecticide-free harvest

All of these practices, mostly funded through CSS, have been practiced for many years at the farm. One key additional change to management this year has been the ceasing of insecticide use. Up until September last year, insecticides were not used as a rule throughout the bird breeding season, to prevent the destruction of key bird food resources or a natural enemy army to help with in crop pest control. This year we have taken this one step further by removing insecticide use altogether. So far, our crops are looking as good as ever, and the farm is full of insect life.

SMA changing the course of our lives.

We never know what lies behind that next corner, and it had been certainly surprising revelation to us what has unfolded in front of us at the beginning of 2018.

Me and my wife were expecting our first baby. We were so looking forward to welcoming our baby boy and cherish those first moments of having him in our arms. Unfortunately, all of that was taken away from us the moment René tried to draw his first breath.

Being in the completely unknown waters, not knowing why and what is happening quickly changed from being two people anticipating great joy and contentment to weeks of constant uncertainty mixed with hope and enormous pain.

We lost our beloved René after eight weeks, he left this world in our arms knowing that we loved, treasured and appreciated every single moment we had together. We never left his side and we are grateful for every precious minute spent with him. René managed to have such an impact on our and our close friends' lives and put so many things into perspective.

René was diagnosed after four weeks with SMA Type 1, there was nothing we could do to safe René . We have received incredible support from our close friends, family and our employers. The individual nurses that helped us to care for René were incredible and we can never thank them enough for their understanding and support.

Spinal Muscular Atrophy, or SMA is a rare inherited neuromuscular condition with devastating effect. One in 35-40 people is a carrier of the faulty gene and one in 6000 to 10000 babies are born with SMA. Individuals who have one faulty copy and one functioning copy of SMN1 are called carriers. Carriers do not have SMA, but they may pass the faulty gene on their children. Many times, carriers do not know they are carriers until they have a child born with SMA. When two carriers have a child, there is a 25% chance that the child will be unaffected, a 50% chance that the child will also be a carrier and a 25% chance that the child will have SMA. This risk is the same for each pregnancy.



There are four primary types of SMA—1, 2, 3, and 4—based on the age that symptoms begin, and highest physical milestone achieved. Individuals with SMA have difficulty performing the basic functions of life, like breathing and swallowing. However, SMA does not affect a person's ability to think, learn, and build relationships with others.

We support SMA UK, a charity dedicated to those that are affected by SMA. We are very pleased that we are in the position to support the charity and help to raise awareness of the condition which may affect the lives of any of us or our friends and family.
