Papworth to Caxton Gibbet/A428 cycleway

The project to construct a cycleway/footpath along the A1198 from Papworth to join the existing cycleway running from the A428 Caxton Gibbet roundabout towards Cambourne, is progressing. The Parish Council has been advised by the Project Manager that the detailed design is on track to be delivered by 20 December. We will have a further update in the New Year, but the Project Manager as advised that he hopes work to construct the cycleway will commence in the first quarter of 2020.

The preliminary design for the A428 / A1198 junction as part of the A428 upgrade project has recently been released to the County Council by Highways England. We have been advised that as part of the design for the replacement A428/A1198 junction, construction of a new roundabout between the I-Way Inn and the currently existing roundabout is planned. In addition a cycle path to link to the current cycleway towards Cambourne will be installed. It has therefore been agreed between Highways England and the County Council that the section of cycleway from the I-Way Inn to where it joins the current cycle way will be constructed as part of this project using a temporary surface which will then be replaced with a full hard surface once the A428 Project work is underway. We have been assured that the temporary surface will still be fit for use for pedestrians, cyclists and wheelchair users.

The Parish Council will provide further updates as they arise.

Bus Shelter

Although it has taken a while to deal with the insurance claim and obtain quotes for replacement of the Bus Shelter on Ermine St North, which was partially demolished by an articulated lorry performing a U-turn in the road, the Parish Council has finally been given the go ahead to have the shelter replaced.

A contractor has been appointed and initial work to remove the old structure and concrete pad has been undertaken. The new concrete pad has been installed and the replacement shelter is on order from the supplier. The hardwood shelter has to be made to order so we have been advised that the shelter will be delivered and installed week commencing 7th January.

Request for provision of a skate park

Periodically the Parish Council received request for a skate park and other such facilities in the village and suggestions of where these could be sited.

The Parish Council is in quite the unusual position, that we do not own any land in the village and therefore do not have anywhere we could install a skate park, so unfortunately it is not as straight forward as just building one.

All the areas run by the Parish Council are leased (eg Playing Fields) and not owned by us with exception of the cemetery.

The majority of land in the village including the business park is owned by either the Varrier-Jones Foundation or the Papworth Trust.

It is regularly suggested that the old BMX track may be a suitable location (this land is owned by the Papworth Trust) or the car park area next to the allotments (this is owned by the Varrier-Jones Foundation and is currently leased as part of the hospital site). The car park area is due to transfer back to the Varrier-Jones Foundation once the lease has expired and is due to be returned to agricultural land. The Parish Council has previously looked into the availability of space on the Playing Field to see whether this might identify a viable space on which something could be constructed but unfortunately this could not be achieved without the loss of one of the football pitch areas and the area is too close in proximity to adjacent housing. Many other things would also have to be taken into consideration including obtaining permission from our Landlords to actually use the playing field in the first place, noise levels and planning consent in addition to ongoing insurance and maintenance costs.

If someone were to approach the Papworth Trust or V-JF and gain agreement for them to provide a suitable location, and bring a costed proposal to the Parish Council we would consider this as an option, although without owning the land the Parish Council are likely to have issues with trying to obtain insurance to cover the facility.

The Parish Council would look for a team of people to get involved in any project, garner support from the village, raise funds and apply for grants. To give an idea of cost, the Clerk has spoken to Potton Town Council who have built a skate park in the last year 2 years and has been advised that the skate park cost just under £100K.

Donation Gone to a Good Cause

We have recently returned from Zimbabwe where we visited our friends, Graham and Sarah Giles, who live in Bulawayo and are working with Mazwi, a community in the bush. Sarah and Graham have asked us to pass on their grateful thanks to the congregation of St Peter's church for kindly donating the Harvest Service collection towards bricks for the new Early Childhood Development Centre to be sited in the community building which is being built in the centre of Mazwi.

The ECD school for 4-5 year olds currently runs in a make shift building walled with blue plastic sheets so the brick built building will be so welcome. Graham and Sarah thought it was special that the Papworth Church is called St Peter's because Mazwi was originally called St Peter's extension and is situated not far from the community of St Peter's. Children from the ECD go on to St Peter's Primary School when they are 5.



The building under construction will also encompass a new church building and community area plus kitchen and toilets and will be in the heart of the village and they plan for it to be used for spiritual, educational, and health purposes (the HIV Mamas Support Group will meet there). While we were there the church had it's fun day and as well as lots of activities on the "field" and play area that adjoins the new building, a group of the village ladies cooked a wonderful meal of guinea fowl stew, Eland mince, cabbage relish and sadza (corn meal), all on an open fire,. Imagine how good it will be when this can all be cooked in the new kitchen. The village currently has no electicity and water only comes to standpipes with tanks at the side of the tracks and has to be carried to separate homes. The dream is to have electricity and mains water in the building. Renting out the building to other communities will also bring in revenue.

Very many thanks to St Peter's Congregation from the people of Mazwi for your support.




Kyle D Evans - Pop Song's for Pedant's

Real Christmas Tree or Artificial?

In 1841 Prince Albert (Queen Victoria's German husband) put up a Christmas tree in Windsor Castle. Then in 1848 a drawing of the Queen's Christmas tree at Windsor was published in the illustrated London News. This was the start of the popularity of Christmas trees in Britain. In Victorian times they would be decorated with candles. These days most of us have a Christmas tree in our homes at Christmas.

If you are thinking of buying a new artificial Christmas tree this year you might want to consider getting a real one instead. You will need to use your artificial Christmas tree for 10 years to offset its carbon footprint. Artificial trees are mainly made in China and transported worldwide. They are generally made of metal and PVC.



More recently aluminium and fibre optic trees are available.

The idea that having a real Christmas trees causes deforestation is untrue. Nowadays Christmas trees are grown on Christmas tree farms as crops. As trees are cut down each Christmas new ones will be planted. It is far better for the environment to buy a real Christmas tree that is grown locally if you can. It is often possible to buy directly from the farm.

In Papworth we are lucky enough to have two Christmas tree farms both within a 30 mile drive. At Badger Hill Christmas Tree Farm Maulden Bedford there are over 10,000 Christmas trees. You can wander through the plantation and choose your tree then cut it down yourself, if you want to, before bringing it home. That's what

my family will be doing this year and my sons will be both want to be the one to cut it down! But if you don't fancy cutting it down yourself, then the farm staff will be happy to cut it down for you.

They also sell container grown Christmas trees if you would like to plant out it in the garden after Christmas. Or it could be left in the pot and brought back into the house next Christmas. The RHS advise bringing a pot grown tree into the house as late as possible as it won't be happy indoors for much longer than 12 days. It will help to keep it in a cool room.

The other Christmas tree farm within easy reach is Parsonage Farm near Bottisham, open at weekends. They have cut trees, you can cut your own or they will cut a fresh tree while you wait. Cash payment.

A Christmas tree newly harvested will stay fresher for longer than the trees that have been cut and left lying around for days, especially if the tree is stood in a bucket of water for a few hours in the garden as soon as you get it home. To preserve its life longer, once in the house, it should should be stood in water which is topped up daily to prevent it drying out. I know from experience a Christmas tree can drink a pint of water a day over the Christmas period. I always buy my Christmas tree the first weekend in December and take it down on the 12th day of Christmas. It is up for a long time, so I also mist it with water to help to prolong its freshness. It usually does pretty well with minimal needle loss.

After Christmas disposing of your used real Christmas tree should not be a problem. You can dispose of your tree and at the same time support a local charity. For a donation the Arthur Rank Hospice Charity is collecting real Christmas trees for recycling. They will be collected January 9th, 10th and 11th in CB23. You will need to register with the charity to have your tree collected. https://www. charityxmastreecollection.com/xmas-trees/. Real trees can be also be chopped up and put in the green recycling bin. Artificial trees are more difficult to recycle. They are often made from a combination of metal and plastic making recycling possible but difficult, so they usually end up in land fill sites.



Our sporting teams have also been busy taking part in football and netball tournaments already this term.


