We were all hugely disappointed that our season came to such an abrupt end. Our end of year Presentation could not go ahead in May, but we are working on a plan to award trophies observing social distancing measures as soon as practical.

The 2020-21 season will resume in September, and I'm busy registering players for the new season. Harvest Time



If there is one certain thing in these uncertain times its that the Harvest will happen. Farmers will be dusting off their combines and we will pause on our walks to watch the spectacle that is Harvest Time.

Many years ago my Dad was up, dawn until dusk, testing the ears of Wheat and Barley and watching the weather and getting the machines out as soon as the crops were ready. We did not get a holiday until September, and if the harvest was in before the bank holiday weekend then they thought they had done well. These days, with larger machines, gps, air conditioned cabs with radios and large spotlights and headlights the work can carry on late into night and can be finished well before the Autumn rain. Summer weather permitting of course. Then it will start all over again, ploughing sowing and growing for next year.

Hedgerows are a great harvest habitat for wildlife. Blackberries, Sloes, Elderberries, Rose Hips, Hawthorn plus the seeding flowers and grasses that grow at the foot of the hedge all provide food for our mammals and birds. All this food is needed to get them through the winter whether they are hibernating mammals or migrant birds getting ready for their long flight back to warmer countries.

August is good month to go Butterfly Hunting. Painted Ladies,(Vaneesa Cardui) are one of our beautiful butterflies. Painted Ladies complete their life cycle in five to eight



weeks. They like to lay their eggs on thistles from about May onwards and adult butterflies can be seen in August and are attracted to Buddleia plants. They take on an incredible migration pattern. They arrive on our shores from continent each summer and migrate south each autumn. They make this return journey at high altitudes and is not undertaken by individual

butterflies but as a series of steps of about six generations. They keep breeding and moving on until they arrive back in Africa. What a journey for a small creature.

August is a month that belongs to the insects and a brilliant bug hunting month.

Crickets and Grasshoppers can be found in abundance in may of the patches of long grass found around the village,

so take your bug hunting kit. The striking yellow and black caterpillars of the Cinnabar Month are usually found in on the Ragwort plant easily found on the small strip of set aside near the woods.

The last few winters we have had a Tawny Owl, possibly two in the woods and in August they start calling to set up territories so listen out on a warm summer evening.

By the time mid August has arrived its hard to think that summer is nearly over Swifts will have already left on their long journey back to Africa.



As will Blackcaps. Swallows and House Martins leave a little later, and will start to gather in flocks and can be seen on the telephone wires and swooping to gather up any food they can before starting on their long migration.

As a village we are so lucky to have access to the woods, thanks to the land owner. With the good weather during lockdown, it was a lifesaver for many to be it able to walk and see the Bluebells and experience the joys of a spring woodland. The woodland has continued to have an increase in footfall and whilst it is lovely that so many have been able to have the time to experience the outdoors it has now begun to look a little sad and battle weary. Instead of just one path, now several paths have been forged and the undergrowth is looking a bit bare. Saplings have been broken down, litter has been left, signs have been removed and even a swing has appeared. Please respect the woods. They are designated a Sight of Scientific Interest, a wildlife haven, not a playground. A problem, I hasten to add, not just here but repeated all over the country.

So far this year we have had drought and heat followed by torrential rain. Despite that our crops up the allotment are generally doing well.



These are our gooseberries starting to form and looking delicious.



Our apples are also promising a lot and looking good. These are a mixture of Katy and Fiesta varieties.

Some of our crops are not so good such as our sweetcorn, although we planted ours direct in the soil as seeds and others who planted their's at home and grew on to small



plants before planting out are looking far better. Maybe something for us to try next year.

Wildlife is very important to us up the allotment, without it few crops are pollinated and the bad bugs (blackfly, greenfly etc) are not kept in check by good bugs (ladybirds, hoverfly etc). To encourage insects we sometimes plant non food plants such as sunflowers.

Here they are growing against the mature asparagus (very fern like and over 1.5 metres tall) and yes some verbascum weeds (we like them). We also let some plants go to seed and attract insects. But some plants attract insects as part of their normal flowering season. Here are some bees on our blackberries.



Both a bumble bee and a honey bee making good use of the blackberry bush.



Our globe artichoke, as well as being a beautiful sculptural plant is also great at attracting bees, this bumble bee is dusted with pollen and still going back for more.

Overall our allotment is about encouraging wildlife, getting fresh air and exercise as well as us getting fresh food to eat. Which are all good things we think.

An opportunity to re-set

The prospect of flying to a holiday destination is suddenly the old norm; 2020 is the year when many of us are discovering the delights of staying in the UK. It has to be good for the economy as well as our carbon footprint but it also demands a re-think on what it means

to be "on-holiday"; what we do, where go, how we spend time, who we are with, the uncertainty of the weather and therefore what needs to be packed is all subject to change.

I have fond memories of the years, as a child, when my parents hired a cottage on the Northumberland coastline for 4 weeks in August. Dad would be with us for 2 weeks and join us at weekends only for the other 2; leaving Mum my sister and me without the family car, spending our days doing simple things, not going very far but returning home thoroughly "chilled", and ready for a new term.

Simplicity extended to what we knew as "treats" – an ice-cream only when Dad was with us, perhaps a meal out once during the stay. Even so it was not much of a rest for Mum, more a change of venue and base.

The gospel records offer us a picture of Jesus' life where simplicity was a hallmark. He was not stressed by the knowledge the wine had run dry at a wedding party, or thousands of hungry people could only muster a few loaves and a couple of fish between them. Nobody suffered because he showed them how to call on the God of miracles to meet those challenges and situations. They discovered their lack were opportunities to tap into God's generosity and abundance, by taking note of and heeding Jesus' instructions.

In the past few weeks I have seen signs how the "lockdown" has given people time and space to give attention to their spiritual needs. Too much busy-ness is not good for the soul. It reminds me of an old hymn with this verse:

> Take time to be holy, speak oft with thy Lord; Abide in Him always, and feed on His Word.

Make friends of God's children, help those who are weak,

Forgetting in nothing His blessing to seek.

I encourage you to get beyond the jargon: for example - to speak with the Lord is what we commonly call prayer; feeding on the Word is in essence making time to read the Bible regularly and thoughtfully.



Residents urged to keep caring by binning face coverings and PPE correctly

People in Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire are being asked to make sure disposable face coverings and masks are put in their black wheelie bins at home, to help control the spread of Coronavirus.

Masks and gloves cannot be recycled -please put in your general waste bin The Greater Cambridge Shared Waste Service, a partnership between Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire District councils, is expecting a rise in disposable face coverings in waste collections as they become mandatory in shops from today (Friday 24 July).

The service has already seen disposable PPE such as face coverings, masks and gloves in the blue recycling bins, despite none of these items being recyclable.

With a rise in use expected over the coming weeks, waste bosses are urging Page 14

people to keep caring by disposing of the items correctly, which will help ensure recycling is not contaminated and control the spread of the virus.

Disposable PPE can be put in litter bins outside of shops, but if there isn't one they need to be taken home and put in the black bin.

Advice has been published on the Government's website, and it is important to remember that if you are suffering from Coronavirus symptoms, any medical waste and PPE should be bagged separately and left for three days before going into your black bin.

The councillor responsible for waste, said: "Face coverings are mandatory in shops from today so this is a timely reminder that we all need to do our bit to ensure we dispose of them properly. Washable cloth face coverings are more environmentally friendly than disposable ones, which cannot be recycled and end up in landfill. We have already seen disposable masks in our blue bins and we want to avoid a rise in their usage over the weeks ahead – which could mean recycling becomes contaminated. If we all do our bit, we can keep caring for one another and our environment too."
