New Cancer Hospital for South Cambridgeshire

Anthony Browne, MP for South Cambridgeshire has welcomed the announcement of funding for a new cancer hospital to be built alongside Addenbrooke's.

Matt Hancock, Secretary of State for Health, announced £120 million in funding for the Addenbrooke's Cancer Hospital this evening (Friday 2 October).

The proposed hospital will bring together clinical expertise from Addenbrooke's with world-class scientists from the Cancer Research UK Cambridge Centre and the University of Cambridge, locating them right in the heart of the bio-medical campus.

Plans approved by Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust board and passed to the government earlier this year feature inpatient and outpatient facilities, with a diagnostics unit, acute assessment unit and a pharmacy included in the bid.

The hospital may also include two new game-changing centres of excellence: the National Institute for the Early Detection of Cancer and the Institute for Integrated Cancer Medicine, each with a focus on translating research and technology into cancer prevention, early detection, precision medicine.

Anthony commented: "This is fantastic news for South Cambridgeshire and represents exactly the kind of specialist service I want to see brought to our local community. This formed an essential part of my campaign in December and I have made strong representations to the Secretary of State to see this project funded.

"This new facility has the potential to dramatically transform not only the hopes of cancer sufferers in our area, but our ability to understand and conquer cancer.

"Building on previous announcements of funding for a new Children's hospital and Cambridge South Station, this represents over a quarter of a billion pounds in investment for South Cambridgeshire. I am thrilled to see this Government keeping its promises to our residents, and I will continue to push for even more investment South Cambs."



OVERHANGING HEDGES & TREES

I have been asked by Cambridgeshire County Council's Highways Department to remind householders that hedges and trees should not be allowed to encroach onto the public highway.

The owner or occupier of a property has a legal responsibility (Highways Act 1980 s154) to ensure that the 'public highway' adjacent to a property is not obstructed by vegetation from their property. The public highway is defined by law as consisting of any verge, footway, bridleway or footpath that is maintained at public expense and over which the public has right of way.

Local Authorities have a legal duty to ensure that public highways are unobstructed, so usually inspect roads regularly and often receive complaints from members of the general public.

When Local Authorities become aware of such obstructions, they will usually advise the property owner or occupier of the problem. They may sometimes raise the issue with an owner/occupier even if the vegetation only overhangs the pavement/roadway by a small amount. If the owner/occupier does not take corrective action within a reasonable time (the Local Authority will normally specific a time limit for the work to be completed), the Local Authority can issue a formal notice for the work to be undertaken, and if that is ignored, they can do the work and charge the owner/occupier.

If your hedge is a bit unruly, now is the perfect time of year to get those shears and hedge trimmers out and get trimming to help keep our pathways clear and unobstructed!

Issues with paths/pavements including overhanging branches can also be reported to Cambridge County Council's Highways Department via their online reporting tool https://highwaysreporting.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/

SPEEDING

Over the past month or two the Parish Council has been contacted by several residents expressing their concerns once again at the speed at which vehicles are travelling through the village – not only on Ermine Street but on the side roads too, including Elm Way, Varrier Jones Drive, Chequers Lane and through the Summersfield estate.

Even though part of Ermine Street, from Jubilee Green to the north of the junction with Varrier Jones Drive, is subject to a 20mph limit and despite traffic calming measures the length of Ermine Street, including speed tables and give way points, cars are still driving through the village at quite a speed.

Speed enforcement can only take place on roads which have been adopted by Highways, but without solid proof of speeding, the Police are unable to commit to setting up speed cameras or taking action.

The best way to provide the necessary proof, is to set up a SpeedWatch scheme in the village.

Once speeding has been identified and documented as an issue in a particular location, we can then be considered for enforcement work by officers.

The Community SpeedWatch scheme, run by Cambridge Constabulary, trains volunteers from members of the community to get actively involved in monitoring the speed of vehicles travelling through their neighbourhood. Volunteers are trained to use speed indicator devices which display vehicle speeds. The registered owner of any vehicle seen exceeding the speed limit is sent an advisory letter by the Constabulary, explaining that speeding is unacceptable to the local community and asking them to be more considerate.

Volunteers typically offer 1 to 2 hours a month helping to reduce the speed of vehicles driving through their neighbourhood. There is no expected time commitment, volunteers attend sessions when they like, and it's a great opportunity to meet new people, and enjoy the activity whilst benefiting your community. All volunteers are fully trained and insured by the Constabulary.

To get a scheme up and running in the village would require a core of at least 10 volunteers to be trained and run the scheme and 3 people at a time monitoring traffic speed.

Unfortunately previous requests posted in the News and Views have met with a poor response with only 1 or two people expressing an interest in becoming part of a scheme for our village. If you have a little time to spend and would be interested in volunteering to participate in a SpeedWatch scheme please let us know. If we can garner sufficient interest, we will look into it further.

WORK AT THE PLAYING FIELDS

Work is well underway for the construction of a new single storey pavilion, creation of a hard surface car park plus installation of an additional floodlight and alterations to the existing boundary fencing of the tennis courts.

The Changing Rooms have undergone a refurbishment and the pavilion groundworks and the car parking area are almost complete - we are currently awaiting delivery of the pavilion structure.

As part of the works, the entranceway to the car park will also be widened to improve access, although we are still waiting to receive written consent from the County Highways Department before this work can proceed. The brick plinth at the entrance will be reconstructed and the original King George V Playing Fields plaque will be built into the new pillar at the entrance way once constructed.

PARISH OFFICE & VILLAGE HALL

At the current time, the Parish Office, situated on the 1st floor of the Village Hall remains closed. The Clerk continues to work from home and can be contacted by email clerk@ papwortheverarpc.org.uk (Messages may also be left on the office answerphone on 01480 830360 but callers may experience a delay in a response as the answerphone is only checked for messages periodically).

The Village Hall also remains closed, although the Village Hall Committee are reviewing the situation on an ongoing basis. The Village Hall will be reopened once it is agreed that this can be done in a COVID-secure way, in line with Government guidelines and with the necessary social distancing rules being observed. Local Plan ... Your thoughts please

As many of you are aware South Cambridgeshire District Council of started the process of the next Local Plan which includes the Call of Sites. The Local plan is a plan for the future development of the local area, drawn up by the Local Planning Authority, South Cambs. It guides decisions on whether or not planning applications can be granted and will direct new development in South Cambs up to 2032. South Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridge City Council undertake this process together and will develop a join Local plan.

The Call for Sites started in 2019, and is the opportunity for land owners to put forward sections of land to be consider for development in the coming years. It is normal at this stage for massive amounts of land to be put forward many which are rejected due to not being suitable.

The next public consultation stage will be the Preferred Options public consultation, planned for Autumn 2021. In the meantime, the Councils are working on evidence that will inform the plan, alongside reviewing the comments and testing the sites received through the consultation.

Later this autumn, the Councils are planning to publish a report on some initial findings of key evidence, including scenarios for the jobs and homes to be planned for, and for strategic spatial options. These will be tested against the overarching themes of climate change, biodiversity and green spaces, wellbeing and social inclusion, and great places. Planners will also be talking to community groups including Parish Councils and Residents Associations, stakeholder organisations, and other bodies about these initial findings.

Developers' site suggestions for South Cambridgeshire - West and North of Cambridge

10,000 Homes on agricultural land around Elsworth, Boxworth, Knapwell. This is the North Cambourne proposal which is the land from the Cambourne Roundabout on the old A428 to the Knapwell turnoff

7,080 Homes at Pitt Dene Farm, Elsworth this is the Land on the left hand side as you travel between Papworth and Elsworth along Rogues Lane

4,000 Homes on land north and south of the A428 at Croxton

3,596 Homes on land north east of Bourn

2,300 Homes on land south of School Lane and east of A1198, at Cambourne

1,820 Homes on land west of Broadway and south of Beaufort Road in Cambourne

EAST-WEST RAIL IS ON TRACK

Jordi Beascoechea, the Engagement Manager at East-West Rail, has updated the stages and approvals needed before construction starts in 2025.

He writes: Following the

announcement of the Preferred Route Option for East West Rail between Bedford and Cambridge in January, the East West Railway Company (EWR Co) team has continued to work on developing options for the Preferred Route Alignment. The whole company has been working from home since March – as you may remember we were forced to cut our series of community events short as a result of Covid. However, we are still on schedule, and the process we published in January in the leaflet 'The route to construction' (pictured above) is still on track.

As part of the activity we are doing to develop route alignment options, we are also considering station sites, studying connections with local transport networks, and undertaking land and environmental surveys. Once options for the preferred route alignment are sufficiently advanced, we will present them to you and the communities along the route as part of a second round of non-statutory consultation so that you can all have your say. We are aiming to hold this consultation in early 2021.

As the situation with Covid unfolds, we have also started to rethink the way we communicate with you. Leadership from the Parish Council attended a virtual meeting we held on 24th August where we discussed some of the options, and we advised them that we will be launching an online community hub soon.

Challenging Times ... Nigel di Castiglione - Team Rector

A feature of these challenging times in 2020 is a general agreement people are more ready to pray. Uncertainty and times of unprecedented change in the way we live often have that effect. If we are honest with ourselves, most of us would like God just to turn the clock back and return things to how they were. That rarely happens. As a Christian I believe God is not so committed as we are to making the new normal just a better version of the old! He moves us forward and on, even though we can't recognise the destination whilst en-route.

At the heart of how Christians pray is the petition things be "... on earth as it is in heaven..." The phrase comes from what is often called The Lord's Prayer. It is a bold request because it is an invitation for the God we believe and trust in to initiate change according to the template of a realm we may only glimpse in terms of understanding. It assumes a subordination of my worldview to that of another; and that undermines my desire for independence and (at times) a sense of misplaced invincibility.

We often talk about getting "older and wiser". In reality it is not always the case, but it can be! For example, older people are forced to admit there comes a point when they can't do everything they once did; even if it is just not at the same pace. There is a wisdom about how to embrace such changes gracefully, realistically, with a sense of vulnerability and needing the help of others.

Many older people are familiar with the Lord's Prayer and may well have sought it, dusted it down and built it into the rhythm of a new norm in the course of the past few months. In so doing we may be drawing from the rich treasury of the Christian heritage we bought into in earlier life and can now reactivate as what have become old norms are stripped away from us.

The good news is the practice of prayer and the framework provide by the Lord's Prayer are not time-limited. They are for people of all ages, cultures and eras. There have no "use by" date. As we were forced to discover just before Easter, the practice and content of prayer is not dependent on having access to particular spaces or buildings; because it is about articulating a relationship, shaped by faith and hope.

Here it is for easy reference. Many find it helpful to say it slowly, taking a line or phrase at a time and pondering the meaning as we offer it to God. It's another discipline that will make you feel at home when you come to a church gathering. It's very much still in use, Sunday by Sunday whether at home, in church services and whenever people draw near to God.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed by your name, your kingdom come your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours
now and for ever. Amen



RSPB Hope Farm 20th Anniversary Webinar Series

October 2020 – February 2021

This year is a year for celebration at Hope Farm. Even with the current obstacles in place, we are working to demonstrate and share key lessons learnt on the farm in the last 20 years. This includes the expertise from outside the organisation, from partnerships and coalitions that have evolved with Hope Farm at the heart of these conversations. Farm Wildlife package and Fair to Nature - OCTOBER 28th Hope Farm has been a key demonstrator of the Fair to Nature certification scheme, giving farms the opportunity to label their food as Fair to Nature. It has also been a key demonstration site for Farm Wildlife, demonstrating the 6 point plan for guaranteed nature-recovery on lowland arable farmland.

Speakers will include Richard Winspear, head of the RSPB's Agricultural Advice team, and key collaborator in the Farm Wildlife coalition, plus a speaker from the Fair to Nature certification scheme as it goes through its fresh re-launch this year.

Insecticide free - JANUARY

Hope farm has been insecticide free for two years, and the farm's contractor, Martin Lines has successfully run his farm insecticide free for five years.

This webinar will feature experiences from Martin Lines, alongside key research and Hope Farm's experiences of insecticide-free farming. We will then move to Callum Wier's organic farm at the National Trusts Wimpole Estate, to find out how they manage insecticide-free in an organic setting. Achieving Sustainable Agricultural Systems / Ecological Intensification - DECEMBER

The ASSIST program, of which Hope Farm is a participant, is a nationwide set of projects investigating environmental impacts in agriculture, environmental limitations on on agriculture, and ways that we can continue to sustain yield for the long term, using nature-based solutions.

ASSIST project leader, Richard Pywell will be talking about the project, followed by practical experiences of Hope Farm's participation in the project, from Georgie Bray. Soil health and cover crops – NOVEMBER 24th

Hope Farm's findings so far from the in-house, 5-year, cover crop and project will be discussed by Rob Field, Conservation Scientist.

Steve Corbett from Agrii will then discuss their organisation's current research in cover crops, using them profitably to improve soil health and crops in heavy clay soils. Agrii were one of the key sources of advice at the start of the hope farm trials, and their knowledge base has expanded massively in the last five years too.

Future ELMS schemes and future funding for wildlife friendly farming - FEBRUARY

Hope Farm demonstrates that with current schemes in place, wildlife-friendly farming can turn a profit at least as good as conventional farms. However, policies are changing, and we need to ensure that in future policies, this kind of farming is supported on a much larger scale.

The RSPB policy team will talk about what we have been asking of policy-makers particularly in recent years, led by Tom Lancaster, head of Agricultural Policy.

Martin Lines, Hope Farm's contractor, and chair of the Nature Friendly Farming Network, will then talk about NFFN's asks of future policy, and where they think we will be able to secure funding in the future for wildlife-friendly farming.

MP urges Eligible Residents in South Cambridgeshire to get Flu Vaccine this Winter

Local MP Anthony Browne has urged all those in South Cambridgeshire who are eligible for the flu jab to get one this winter, as the Government launches its drive to vaccine 30 million people.

The drive to vaccines comes as new research from Public Health England suggests that people who tested positive for both flu and Covid-19 were more than twice as likely to die, compared to those with Covid-19 alone. The research also found that those with co-infection of the two viruses were more at risk of severe illness.

Commenting, Anthony Browne MP said:

"As we approach the winter, it is imperative that everyone who needs a flu vaccination takes up the offer to have one.

"I urge everyone in South Cambridgeshire who is eligible to get vaccinated, which could make an important difference if they should also catch coronavirus in the months ahead.

"Controlling the spread of coronavirus and protecting the NHS is on all of us – we must all wash out hands, cover our faces and make space – as well as taking sensible steps like getting a flu jab."
