The Community Lifeline Service

Are you looking for peace of mind? If you live alone or someone in your family is sometimes left alone and may need to call for assistance, the Council's Lifeline team can help.

In an emergency, pressing a button connects you via a contact centre with family, friends, neighbours, or the emergency services.

Giving you peace of mind and reassurance. The Community Lifeline Service allows people, young and old to stay in their homes longer and live independently. It is run by South Cambridgeshire District Council.

How IT WORKS

In case of an emergency, you can press the lifeline button. This can be worn around your neck or on your wrist. When pressed, the button sends a signal to a small base unit that is connected to your telephone.



This dials the contact centre who. after a few moments, will speak to you through the loudspeaker on the unit. You can then

Everyone using the lifeline service needs a local emergency contact - a friend, neighbour or family member - who lives locally and has a key (or access via a key safe) to your home. In the case of an emergency you can ask the contact centre for one of your emergency contacts or the emergency services.

How much it costs

The Community Lifeline Service costs £4.47 per week. This is payable every three months in advance by a £58.11 direct debit. (Whilst direct debit is the preferred payment method, it is possible to pay online or by payment card at the Post Office). The installation charge is £30. Additional buttons are available for £50. For tenants living on a South Cambridgeshire District Council Sheltered Scheme the cost is £3 per week charged separately to the rent account.

Papworth Everard Parish Council Report

Speeding

Following last month's call for volunteers to participate in a SpeedWatch scheme for the village, we have unfortunately only received 2 offers of help.

To get a scheme up and running in the village would require a core of at least 10 volunteers to be trained and run the scheme and 3 people at a time monitoring traffic speed. If you are able to spare a couple of hours a month to help out, please get in touch.

Speed enforcement can only take place on adopted Highways, but without solid proof of speeding the Police are unable to commit to setting up speed cameras or taking action.

The best way to provide the necessary proof, is to set up a SpeedWatch scheme in the village.

Areas where speeding is identified as an issue can then be considered for enforcement work by officers.

The Community SpeedWatch scheme, run by Cambridge Constabulary, encourages volunteers from members of the community to get actively involved in monitoring the speed of vehicles travelling through their neighbourhood. All volunteers would be fully trained and insured by the Cambridgeshire Constabulary.

Volunteers are trained to use speed indicator devices which display vehicle speeds. The registered owner of any vehicle seen exceeding the speed limit is sent an advisory letter by the Constabulary, explaining that speeding is unacceptable to the local community and asking them to be more considerate.

Volunteers typically offer 1 to 2 hours a month helping to reduce the speed of vehicles driving through their neighbourhood. There is no expected time commitment, volunteers attend sessions when they like, and it's a great opportunity to meet new people, and enjoy the activity whilst benefiting your community.

Papworth to Caxton Gibbet/A428 cycleway

The project to construct a cycleway/footpath along the A1198 from Papworth to join the existing cycleway running from the A428 Caxton Gibbet roundabout towards Cambourne, is continuing, albeit delayed by Covid-19

A TTRO (Temporary Traffic Regulation Order) has been submitted to the County Council Highways Department by the Project Manager detailing proposed traffic management schemes to run from 4 January - 4 June 2021, to allow work to be undertaken.

The proposed traffic management consist of 3-way temporary traffic signals at the north end, on each of the 200m approaches to the Papworth Roundabout, to cover the first section of the scheme. The rest of the scheme could then be completed using off-peak (09:30 to 15:30hrs) 2-way temporary traffic signals, with the exception of the 300m approach to the A428 Caxton Gibbet Roundabout, which will require overnight (19:00 to 06:00hrs) road closures with diversions in place.

A request for a reduction in speed limit from Caxton Gibbet to Papworth Everard, down to 40mph for the duration of the works has also been submitted. Parish Clerk: Sarah Cruse Telephone: (01480) 830360 E-mail: clerk@papwortheverardpc.org.uk

Village Hall Bookings

The Village Hall was reopened for hire by some of our usual regular hirers, on Monday 19 October. Only the Main and North Halls are currently in use.

All hirers have had to provide a risk assessment and floor layout plan, plus details of how their events will be run to ensure Government guidance is followed, to run their sessions safely. These have been reviewed and approved by the Village Hall Committee prior to the bookings being confirmed.

The Hall has undergone a deep clean and hand sanitising stations, posters, floor stickers and tape to ensure social distancing have been installed throughout the Hall. In addition to the regular daily cleaning schedule undertaken by the caretaker, cleaning supplies have been made available so that hirers can also wipe down surfaces before and after use. Maximum numbers for both halls have been set, and fabric seating has been replaced by plastic chairs which can be easily wiped down. Current Government rules stipulate that face coverings must be worn inside the Village Hall (subject to some exemptions).

The Parish Council is awaiting Government guidance on social gatherings, including private events (eg birthday parties), indoor community events etc. For the time being, we are not accepting bookings for any of these types of events. We will announce on our website and Facebook page when we are able to take new booking enquiries.

PAPWORTH EVERARD ALLOTMENT ASSOCIATION



People are really finding out how important fresh air, exercise and fresh fruit & veg are during this strange year of lockdown, mask wearing and other out of the ordinary restrictions.

This is true in Papworth Everard too. We have always run with around 32/33 members on the site with a quite slow turn over of those members. People usually leaving the association only when they move out the area or something happens which means they do not have enough spare time to tend their site. But in the last year we have grown to over 40 members. This is great for us as an association but also shows what a useful facility the allotments are for this village. We have had to make new plots from spare land, plus split a number of full sized plots into $2 \times \frac{1}{2}$ sized plots.

The new members are doing a great job of turning the Cambridge clay into a workable, rich growing medium on the new plots. They have also increased the number of sheds and greenhouses and showing a commitment to their plots. I can assure all of them that once improved the soil returns the energy and hard work put into it with great crops.

Unfortunately, we have not been able to organise any social events this year so we have not been able to get to know our new members (or catch up with existing members) as much as we would like. Hopefully, that will be resolved next year when things get back to something closer to normal.

Winter is a busy time up the allotments, with plenty of manuring going on as well as shed repairs and other maintenance projects we had no time to do in the growing season. I am adding some raised sides to some of our growing beds so we can add plenty of manure to improve the soil as well as feed the plants. This task at least is made easier by the wet soil as I can hammer stakes in easier than in a hot summer.



A little over 8 years ago was the fulfilment of over 5 years of struggle to get allotments for Papworth, I class this as one of my greatest achievements in life, well ok, my only achievement in life, Iol! Yes, I am very proud to have been Chairman at the time (and it would be easy for me to sit back and take all the plaudits) but the truth is, without a great and very hard-working team behind me, including the likes of Mark and Paulette, David and Val, Jo and many others, including the P.C. we would not have got this most valuable of assets for the village.

And to think, having only moved to the village in 2005, i had no real interest in growing vegetables, or perish the thought, actually eating them! (having grown my own (whisper it!) I now enjoy eating veggies!) I only joined to get to know people and maybe make a few friends, well I certainly made some great friends and those memories will stay with me for the rest of my days!

Do I miss it? Yes of course, but sunnier climes beckoned, Thank you all.

Papworth Community Support Group

Since the start of March, a group of us in the village decided to band together to support the local community. Driven by a concern for the welfare of people in our

community during the coronavirus (COVID-19) crisis, our particular concern was for the vulnerable and those in need of help and assistance due to the pandemic. We work in close collaboration with Papworth Everard Parish Council, our District Councillor, Mark Howell, and with the support of South Cambridgeshire District Council.

Our mission is simple – we are here to listen, advise, support the welfare, sanity and spirit of people residing in our wonderful village of Papworth Everard. We meet monthly (virtually, of course!) to discuss any issues we have seen in the village, and to ensure that we have enough resources to support whoever may contact us.

Since the start of the first lockdown, you may have noticed us, either through flyers put through your doors, the Facebook group (coronavirus support – Papworth Everard), posters around the village, or across numerous Facebook sites.

The statistics for the amount of amazing volunteer time from March to May left a huge sense of pride for all of us and our amazing community, here are just a few: Volunteers delivered approximately 1800 prescriptions, provided over 300 hours of local pharmacy support, answered over 750 hours of calls and responded to hundreds of emails. Furthermore, volunteers spent over 500 hours telephoning individuals in need of support including those shielding.

In addition to the Community Support Group, we set up the Papworth Pantry; a resource for any family or individual in the village who requires additional support with food. To date, this has benefitted around 20 families. We have teamed up with the 1st Papworth Scout Group, who, instead of door-to-door collections, set up drop-boxes around the village for residents to donate food to and distribute to Godmanchester Food Bank. Further support initiatives have included the Joy Project, which involved placing birthday posters up around the village of local children unable to see their extended family, and the Pumpkin Hunt, which took place over October half-term as a way to keep children engaged with Halloween, though without the usual door-to-door trick-or-treating.

As the second national lockdown has just been announced, we want to reassure everyone in Papworth we are here to provide help. If you need advice or support with food, are self-isolating or shielding, please get in touch. Please be assured that your details will be kept strictly confidential.

Update From Papworth Surgery



Covid is still affecting all our lives in significant ways, and we are still speaking to most patients on the phone rather than arranging face-to-face appointments. But be reassured that we are seeing patients in the surgery when appropriate; indeed our nurses have continued to do almost all of their normal work. It's hard to do dressings or give an injection on the telephone! In the long term, we think that we will continue to do a lot more on the telephone than we did in the past; it's more convenient for patients than sitting in the doctors' surgery, and we can do a lot on the telephone. Pictures sent from smartphones have great detail and clarity, and are saved securely to your medical record. Please also bear in mind that our very experienced nurse practitioners Claire Hodge and Philippa Lord undertake daily minor illness clinics, and can sort out many acute illnesses.

FLU: The flu immunisation campaign is well under way and many will have already come, but if you are over 65; or are under 65 and have health conditions affecting the heart/ lung/ kidney/ liver/ immune system, please do get in touch. We have clinics arranged for Saturdays 7th and 14th November, as well as some sessions in the working week. In addition the government has arranged that we can obtain more vaccine from mid-November to immunise all those over 50 who would not otherwise be eligible.

Doctors: Drs Flora Bailey, Kari Coulson and Hannah Greenwood are now partners with Dr David Cronk, although Dr Kari Coulson will shortly be on maternity leave. Dr Justin Hirst and Dr Kate Cooper are employed by the Practice, and Dr Lewis Barnes continues to locum with us regularly.

Pharmacist: the clinical pharmacists Kasia Lukaszewska and Izabela Golonka, employed by the Huntingdon Primary Care Network (PCN), a local GP surgeries alliance, of which Papworth Surgery is a member. These pharmacists are working with us to improve safety of prescribed medications, and they undertake careful and thorough medication reviews on behalf of the Practice.

Physiotherapist: Naomi Hodson, also employed by PCN funding, is with us 2 days a week, and is available to advise on all matters relating to joints, bones, ligaments, and muscles. You can book to speak to her by calling reception.

Social Presciber Zoe Dunstan continues to be available. If you are feeling isolated and lonely, she may well be able to help. She might also discuss how to set up care, and also help if you are anxious or depressed. Speak to reception to arrange a call with her.

Are you weary?

As I write the 'second wave' of the pandemic is running amok. Many commentators agree it all feels very different to when the 'full lockdown' was implemented in late March. Now the absence of an end date is making many people decidedly crotchety. Of course, there are many for whom this year's events represent the first major season of strict constraints on what we can do;

whereas others have lively memories of the horrors of war, nights spent in the air raid shelter and food rationing that went on for years.

Some may be asking: what can we do to offset waves of woe some feel more than others?

Christians will be increasing the number and frequency of prayers for the government and other civic authorities. That is not a political statement, but an act of obedience and recognition God works through those in elected and appointed officers of the day. The Bible makes it clear prayer is both a means of drawing from God fresh strength for what we are facing and for releasing God's wisdom and blessing through human agencies.

At the same time this has to be a time for imagining and working hard to create and sustain new ways of being engaged in community. This may well be easier living in a rural village than for others whose homes are in high-rise flats without any easy way to get together with others. Yes, being good neighbours has never been more important.

Some have found an outlet through humour shared through social media. The value of telephone contact has probably been reinforced for others – the chance to hear a familiar voice, to share feelings, glean news and offer insight or wisdom into other people's dilemmas.

The church as a national institution has not had an easy time. Many people were distinctly unimpressed at the caption of the Archbishop of Canterbury celebrating Easter in the kitchen rather than his cathedral church. More recently the news has focussed on failings committed by a few in places of high trust and responsibility whose misdemeanours have left a sorry stain as well having caused terrible damage to their victims. Nothing good has come from awful things having been swept under the carpet in times past. This is a time for being truthful and transparent so that, in time, with due repentance there is the opportunity for a new confidence to emerge again when a new humility and purity of motive are found to be trustworthy, not just a clericalized form of image re-branding .

As we begin to turn attention to what sort of Christmas celebrations we can have (both as church, as families and in our communities) in 2020 this is a time to recognise again God has always been in the business of never giving up on human beings. We celebrate Jesus coming to rescue us and offer us a fresh start. It all began with Mary's step of faith in response to the angel's announcement. As Jesus was conceived physically in Mary by the Holy Spirit, so his presence can be birthed and renewed in us today by the same Holy Spirit.

We were all very proud and celebrated in our weekly 'Teams' assembly when all the classes join in via the internet to celebrate good work and behaviour towards our school motto REACH- respect, effort, achieve and challenge which encapsulates our school values!

The School council are preparing questions to ask our local MP who is coming to visit us after half term- he was due to come in April but we had to re schedule. I will let you know how this event goes (and the questions and answers in the next issue).
