

London Luton Airport – Proposed Flight Path Changes



There are two options:

OPTION 1: create a new airborne holding pattern for LLA arrivals above 8,000 feet and maintain a similar method as currently used, to take them down towards the runway, managing flight instructions manually. This is known as vectoring. This reduces complexity and minimises the change from todays flightpaths at lower altitudes.

OPTION 2: vectoring as in Option 1 but the holding pattern this time will be at 8,000 feet and above, with a number of predetermined arrival flightpaths to which planes will automatically fly without intervention by air traffic controllers. This would reduce air traffic complexity more than Option 1 and is the preferred option.

The new holding zone and associated flight paths could impact the airspace above Papworth and it is possible there could be a noticeable change in the frequency of planes overhead and increase in aircraft noise.

When you view the virtual exhibition (see link below) you will be able to see details of the proposed changes. There is a tool for you to put in your post code and you will find what impact, if any, there is likely to be. Also, you will see an executive summary outlining the proposal along with maps and videos.

The consultation period is set to run for 15 weeks and 5 days, closing, Friday February 5th 2021 and we would encourage you to take a look at the consultation details and submit any comments you may have.

A formal Airport Change Proposal is expected to be submitted to the Civil Aviation Authority in June 2021. If approved, implementation is planned from February 2022.

On October 19th 2020, a public consultation co-sponsored by London Luton Airport (LLA) and National Air Traffic Services (NATS) was launched for review and comment.

Together, LLA and NATS are responsible for low level flight arrivals into Luton Airport and NATS is the main navigation service provider for the United Kingdom.

Changes are proposed to the flightpaths into Luton Airport and to create a new holding area, known as 'stack', to serve the airport, to ensure that the operations for Luton and Stansted do not have an impact on each other. The current airspace design for Stansted and Luton has been relatively unchanged for decades, despite them being two of the five busiest airports in the UK and seeing a significant growth in low fare holidays flying out of both in recent years. Due to their geographical locations being close together it requires a high level of complex manoeuvres on the part of air traffic controllers to manage flights sharing the same approach route, and two holding stacks, as Luton and Stansted currently do. Any arrival delay or disruption at one airport causes unnecessary arrival delay to the other because the flows are so closely shared.

The proposal seeks to introduce a new holding pattern situated in airspace between Alconbury and St Neots that allows the separation for routes into LLA from those going into Stansted. The holding pattern is needed when air traffic is busy, so planes fly in a pre-defined formation until they are cleared to continue with their descent to land. LLA and NATS feel it is time to simplify things - looking to the future, when flights return to pre-pandemic levels coupled with anticipated growth in flight numbers, the airspace design needs to be fit for purpose.

There is no proposal to change the way aircraft depart from Luton, nor would there be changes to the way Stansted arrivals and departures fly.

Councillor Vacancies

Christmas is coming

The question is not "Will it be a white Christmas?" but "What sort of Christmas will it be?" I am writing this article in the middle of November; we can't work out yet what will be

permitted or possible. At the end of the 'annus horribilis', in many homes it will be especially hard if families and friends are not allowed to get together at Christmas. Nevertheless, it is not all bad news; good is emerging and can't be denied.

For example, the uncertainty reminds us many people face Christmas without family and friends every year. For once our empathy can be more realistic; if this makes us more thoughtful, kinder and generous with our hospitality to others in years to come, that can only be a good thing.

The efforts made by government and local authorities to provide some sort of housing for those who are homeless should be applauded. I have noticed, also, the significant and spontaneous increase during 2020 of people donating food and money to help the work of local foodbanks; demand is at unprecedented levels this year. This is a tangible way many of us can do something practical that makes a difference. Thank you. Please keep it up in the months to come as more people face redundancy and the meltdown of their businesses with all the consequential hardship this leads to.

It is highly probable we won't be able to have Carol Services and the like which do so much to bring communities together and remind us of the story of Jesus' birth which changed the course of human history for all people. If absence makes the heart grow fonder in terms of people we love, maybe this year the absence of being able to sing carols and re-tell the Christmas story together will create a hunger for renewed engagement with these things in years to come. We are spiritual people and are less than human if we are not spiritually fed

When Jesus was born, Mary and Joseph had found their world turned upside down in the space of a few months. This included a need to flee the country soon after he was born to avoid the slaughter of young children unleashed by a despotic ruler fearing news of a new King of the Jews. Decades later their story of Jesus' supernatural conception was usually treated with scepticism or even contempt. Thankfully this was not the overriding memory they carried.

The Bible records how Mary guarded like treasure what was said to her and of her child by those who knew and believed the truth about Jesus. She knew Joseph had come to believe her story; she saw the wonder some very ordinary shepherds felt as they saw her child; she had the gifts brought by the Magi in recognition of what God was doing through Jesus. Christmas 2020 may turn out to be much quieter than normal. That too can be an unexpected gift – that Christmas is at best the celebration of the Christ who remains ready to enter our hearts, receive our worship and establish his peace among us.

Flu vaccinations

We have already immunised more people this year than we have done in other years, but there are still some who perhaps ought to have it, who have not. These are everyone over 65, and those under 65 who have conditions affecting the heart, lung, kidneys, liver or brain (such as previous stroke). If this applies to you, please either come and have the vaccine, or let us know that you don't want it, if you have not done so already.

In addition, we have had the go-ahead to offer a flu vaccine to all those over 50 who would not normally be eligible. Please book via reception.

Covid vaccinations

There has been a good deal of press coverage of this recently, but it does look like there are some very effective vaccines coming on stream soon. Trials on safety are still to complete as I write this at the end of November, but I am led to believe that we will have some vaccine to administer to those most at risk this side of Christmas. The initial groups to be offered the vaccine will be those in Care Homes and staff in Care Homes; those over 80 will come next, and then progressively younger age groups. Because vaccine is delivered in multiples of 975, and all doses need to be used within 5 days once received at a Practice, we are going to coordinate with Practices in Huntingdon to offer immunisations. So, our patients may well be offered a vaccination at one of the Huntingdon GP Surgery premises. It is likely that there will be some mass vaccination centres (like the Covid Test centres) too, later on

There are 3 vaccines in the offing, and they do differ from one another. In each case, 2 doses are needed, 3-4 weeks apart; it is important to receive 2 doses of the same vaccine.

Help with Low Mood

Because of the restrictions on people's lives, especially the elderly, but also the youth, mood can be low. Some tips to keep in a better frame of mind include:

Get outside each day if possible, especially if it's sunny. Admire beautiful frosty mornings!

Take some exercise on at least 3 days a week, preferably outside... even if the weather is damp or grey. Is it time to do couch to 5K?

Don't resort to drinking too much; alcohol is a depressant.

Try not to over work. If working from home it may be tempting to work long hours.

Talk to real people, not just zoom calls! Humans are social creatures, and whilst zoom/ skype etc are OK for business meetings and keeping in touch, nothing beats actually seeing real people.

If you have been shut up with family members for weeks, remember that your children are only loaned to you... they will be grown up and off before you know it!

If not working, try to find a reason to get up. Helping others in some way will really boost your own mood.

Of course GPs can help too if you are pretty down; and you might like to look at https://www.keep-your-head.com/, a website run by the NHS Mental Health locally, with lots of tips and links to other organisations who can help you.

The way to use green manure is to plant from seeds, let them grow to a good size, then before they flower (although we don't mind some flowering as the insects love them), you chop them back hard with a strimmer or shears and then you

December Article

As every gardener in Papworth Everard will testify, Cambridge Clay is hard work to dig. In summer it sets like concrete and in winter it sticks to your spade and weighs a ton. There are various ways to break up the clay though, mainly involving digging in either homemade compost, commercial compost, soil improver or manure. A cheap natural compost though is green manure. There are various green manures and all have their different uses, but they all add more to the soil than they remove by growing. Late Autumn/early winter is a great time to plant "winter" green manure.

The one we are using is a mix of Ryegrass and Winter Tares.

The Ryegrass has deep roots that penetrate the clay and pull up minerals that have washed too deep for most plants to use. The Winter



dig both the top growth and the roots in. Ideally you end up with a lovely dug over bed with no green leaves showing (and if you do end up with no green showing, you are doing far better than me!!!). You need to wait 4 weeks and then plant your next crop.

The top growth and roots rapidly compost down and help break up the soil. The nitrogen the manure has trapped in the soil is slowly released and your next crop if far better for it. The green manure also stops any weeds from growing on your plot all winter.

The final good thing with the green manure over winter is that it uses up water, and up the allotments, excess water over winter is a problem until you have improved your soil well enough to let water penetrate the clay.



Nature Diary December by Holly Blue

Winter has arrived and we are still in a lock down situation of some sort. We can still get outside though, just don't forget your wellies.

Why do we like Robins on our Christmas Cards? Robins and winter always seem to go together.

This, like many of our Christmas traditions goes back to the Victorian Times. Victorian postmen wore red uniforms and the Robin on our Christmas Card is thought to symbolise the postman in his red uniform delivering the cards. Well who Knew......probably lots of you.

In Winter we seem to see a lot more of the Robin. It could be that there are more of them around.

Due to shortage of food, Robins from Scandinavia are known to migrate to join our Robins for the winter. These birds can be slightly paler than our own and a little less tame. We are lucky to see and hear Robins all year in this country and both male and female Robins sing all year round from early morning and into the evening, usually marking out their territories, and can very often be seen and heard in the glow a street light if that said light is in their territory.

Over the Christmas period robins will be looking for mates, the males venturing into other Robins territories and being very vocal about it. By mid January most have paired up and the females no longer feel the need to sing quite so much.. Breeding season usually starts around March and they can sometimes have two or three broods a year.

If you being kept awake at night by eerie screams and calls, it's not ghosts, it is the Papworth Foxes establishing breeding territories and trying to attract mates. Their screams can be very loud and high pitched, and can sometimes sound like a human crying for help. A bit scary at times. They are just communicating with each other and will calm down by the end of January. So nothing to worry about.



This time of year Starlings flock together and fill the air with their "murmurations" at dusk. This is a spectacular sight of many hundreds sometimes thousands of birds flying together as if one body, dancing in the sky. The noise is incredible and then suddenly, as if one of them has said

"enough", they all flock down together to roost and it is all over until the next evening. Its all about safety in numbers, it's hard for a predator to target one bird in a flock of thousands, and also many bodies help keep each other warm at night. In past years I have watched them at Fen Drayton RSPB. They like to land in the Reed beds.

Just as the first Swallows are the sign of Summer, the arrival of the Redwings and Fieldfares are a sign that winter is here. They arrive when the temperature starts to drop in their Scandinavian homeland.

The Redwing is the smallest of our Thrushes and get their name from the red patches under their wings.

The Feild fare is larger with a slate grey head. The name means traveller – through - the fields, and this is what they do in large flocks.



Both species like to feed along mixed hedgerows, feeding on hawthorn berries, rowan, holly and rose hips. A good place to spot them in vast numbers, is in the hedgerows along the Eltisley and Yelling roads.

If you are looking for a family trip out it is always worth going to the Wetlands Centre at Welney to see the Welney Swans and other visiting migrants. Hundreds of Whooper Swans from Iceland and Bewick swans from Russia arrive on these wetlands to spend the winter. You can see them from the comfort of a warm heated viewing area or walk the reserve, wellies are definitely needed. At certain times of the day the birds are fed and you can witness them close up as they fly in from near by farmland to spend the night.



You can also feed yourself in the Cafe, or buy gifts from the shop.

The centre itself is still open but certain restrictions are in place and you now have to book. Current updates and information can be found on their website. www.wwt.org.uk.

Remember to keep getting out, we have many walks around the village. You don't have to go far. It may be winter with shorter gloomier days but there is always something to see. It is good for the soul.

Hoping you all have a peaceful Christmas this year and you and yours stay safe, stay healthy and well.



By the time you read this article, we hope that the drilling is complete, with cover crops also planted to protect and improve the quality of the soil. Winter bird seed mixes are in evidence, especially on land to the north west of the farm close to Elsworth, and by Slepewood in Knapwell. The wildflower margins, which play such an important role in increasing the biodiversity of the land, have now all been cut and baled - to allow an opportunity for the new seeds to germinate in the Spring.



Anyone out walking along the edges of the fields over the last few weeks will have seen an abundance of brightly-coloured berries in the hedgerows, ideal for the returning winter thrushes, redwing and fieldfare. These include sloes, blackberries and hawthorn berries.

All of the conservation work that Hope Farm carries out each year is still very much underway this year, despite the fact that it sadly hasn't been possible to showcase this to locals with our Open Farm Sunday event. This year, as we celebrate 20 years of RSPB ownership of the farm, it has also not been possible to commemorate this special anniversary on site with the initial investors, as planned. Instead, a series of webinars has been arranged, which outline the lessons we have learnt from the farm and further afield in wildlife-friendly and sustainable farming. HOPE FARM'S FARMING CALENDAR UPDATE



Of particular note at Hope Farm over the last two decades is the remarkable increase in arable bird populations. Hope Farm has seen four-times more skylarks over the last 20 years. This has been achieved through simple research solutions designed to optimise skylark plots, as well as provisions of winter habitat, which have both successfully enabled the birds to survive, feed and breed. This effective research has fed into the development of a wider stewardship scheme. The 'shrill delight' of the call of the skylark can now be heard all year round here, rather than just in the summer months! Just last week, I was walking across a winter wheat field that we direct drilled into a big tall cover crop (grown to a maintain green cover of plants between crops planted for harvest). After walking through a few fields of winter wheat drilled into bare soil, that had a few hares across them, it was amazing to see the sheer amount of birds using the cover cropped field as habitat. 50 skylarks flushed after walking only 50m into the field! We are still learning all the time on the farm, with these new techniques. We're still on a learning journey to incorporate these new methods into farming here, but it is rewarding to see the difference it makes for

Similarly, grey partridge have returned to Hope Farm and are now holding their



territories each year. During surveys in 2019, Hope Farm recorded all 16 Farmland Bird Index (FBI) species, putting Hope Farm in the top 1% of UK sites for FBI, and the top site for bird species in Cambridgeshire. Despite the fact that Hope Farm utilises wildlife-friendly techniques to ensure the protection of all types of wildlife species, these techniques are not implemented at the expense of profit on the farm - Hope Farm still maintains a stable profit by attaining further income from currently EU funded Countryside Stewardship Schemes. Fingers crossed our current government continues to support this work positively in the future. Our future direction at the farm is to find ongoing solutions to current and future arable farming challenges, without the need to take any further land out of crop production. We strive to demonstrate innovative answers to agricultural and societal problems, such as soil degradation and the use of inorganic fertilisers that impact on our carbon footprint at least. The evidence-based research will stand as a resource to ensure that wildlife-friendly and sustainable farming activities feed into a strong Agricultural Bill, with the environment at the heart of its policies. 
