#### **Report from Dr Flora Bailey**

A year on Covid remains a significant challenge in all of our lives, but hopefully the end is in sight. The pressures of the pandemic means that we have had to adapt our ways of working to reduce the risk to our patients and staff. We are doing many consultations on the telephone and we have found that this is working well. Please be assured that we continue to offer our full range of services and face-to-face appointments are available where necessary.

We are delighted to report that our covid vaccination campaign has been up and running since late January and so far we have delivered over 6000 first doses. We are vaccinating as part of a Primary Care Network (PCN) in conjunction with the Acorn, Charles Hicks, Roman Gate and Priory Fields practices. Together we have been running vaccination clinics from the Charles Hicks Practice in Huntingdon, often at weekends. We have also visited local care homes and our housebound patients to ensure that everyone who is eligible receives their vaccine. The hard work and dedication of all the staff involved has meant that we have been able to deliver this important programme whilst keeping the practices fully open for patients throughout this time. We are calling patients in priority order as set out by the government. Please be assured that you will be called when it is your turn. You may also receive an invitation from the government to have your vaccination at a local vaccination centre, which is not run by the PCN. You can chose whichever is more convenient for you. You will need to return to your original vaccination site to receive the second jab.

**Flu:** If you have not had your flu jab this year then please contact us as we would be delighted offer it to you. This year the government has extended the eligible group to include all over 50s.

**Staff:** Partners David Cronk, Hannah Greenwood and Flora Bailey are working alongside Drs Justin Hirst and Kate Cooper. Partner Dr Kari Coulson is currently on maternity leave following the birth of her daughter. Her sessions are covered by Drs Lewis Barnes and Will Bostock. Our experienced Nurse Practitioners Claire Hodge and Philippa Lord are available to see a wide range of minor illness and injuries as well as manage long term conditions. As always we are supported by our fabulous practice nurses, health care assistants and admin team.

Additional roles: We have several members of staff who are employed by the PCN and work with us on a regular basis. First Contact Physiotherapist Naomi Hodson is working with us on Thursdays. She is an expert in diagnosis and treatment of all things related to joints, muscles and bones and you can book an appointment with her via reception. Marcus Daley our social prescriber continues to support isolated patients and those with complex needs. You can ask for an appointment via reception with him or you can be referred by one of the team. Our clinical pharmacists Kasia Lukaszweska and Feyi Ojo are continuing to conduct thorough medication reviews and ensure medication safety.



With the current restrictions in place, we are not going to be able to run the Sunday afternoon vinyl sessions in the Courtyard café for a while. Let's hope the vaccine rollout continues to gather pace and we can all get together soon.

This are Two Tone (month).

Two Tone was a record label set up in 1979 by Specials frontman Jerry Dammers, run from his Coventry flat. The

name was chosen to reflect the mixed-race nature of the Specials, at a time when racism was rife at gigs. Their punky ska and reggae music attracted trouble from the far right, and let's just say their gigs were "lively" and leave it at that.

Jerry Dammers had an ear for spotting talent and many of the bands' support acts – Madness (from London), The Selecter (Coventry), The Beat (Birmingham) and The Higsons (Norwich) released their first singles on the label.

The label had a near-perfect run of six albums by the Specials, The Selecter, Rico Rodriguez (the Specials' trombonist), and the Special AKA (after the Specials vocalists left to form the Fun Boy Three), two compilation albums and 28 singles all packed into six years. Not surprisingly, Jerry Dammers couldn't keep up that momentum for long while being main songwriter, musical director, producer, keyboard player and all while "living above (in) the shop".

2019 marked the beginnings of the label's 40th anniversary with a 12 x 7" box set and a half-speed master of the Specials debut LP. 2020 brought a CD box set of the six albums and two compilations and half-speed master of the (imaginatively-titled) More Specials. A half-speed master of the Selecter's Too Much Pressure is coming this April. Both The Selecter and the reformed Specials (without Dammers, or – RIP - Rico) continue to tour.

The Two Tone: The Albums 8 CD box is a great buy at about 40 quid. We will, one day, be featuring the label as a theme for a Re-Play Papworth event, playing all that lovely half-speed mastered vinyl. Now, where did I leave that Pork Pie hat?

### Papworth Everard Parish Council Report

#### **DOG FOULING**

It appears that dog mess is becoming more of an issue in the village once again.

Dog fouling is not only unpleasant – it can be dangerous – particularly for children. Whilst rare, contact with dog excrement can cause toxocariasis – a nasty infection that can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and even blindness and seizures.

With the lighter evenings upon us and more children playing out on the on the fields and public areas in the village, allowing your dog to foul and not clearing it up is unacceptable.

Dog mess left on pathways can end up on shoes, scooters, bike wheels and prams and spread all over the place – it really isn't nice.

It is illegal not to clear up the mess left by your dog as soon as it has fouled and those that leave their mess behind could be liable to a fixed penalty notice. It is the responsibility of the dog owner or the person in charge of a dog to clear up any - being unaware a dog has fouled or not having a suitable bag is not a reasonable excuse.

There are many dedicated dog waste bins throughout village so there is no excuse to leave dog mess on the paths and open spaces. If you can't find a dog bin, you can bag your pet's poo, seal it well and place it in any standard litter bin – or take it home for disposal in your Black bin

Throwing filled poo bags into trees and bushes definitely isn't an acceptable way to dispose of your dog's waste.

Dog fouling is particularly unpleasant when it is left on the playing field for people playing sports to tread in. With the lockdown easing over the coming months, the sports pitches will soon be used for football once again. Unfortunately, prior to each match, the football

coaches have to scour the playing field removing piles of dog mess before they can start playing which wouldn't be necessary if dog owners took responsibility for clearing up after their dogs.



#### **FLY TIPPING**

There have been several instances of fly-tipping and dumping of unwanted items in the village in recent weeks.

What is fly tipping?

Fly-tipping is the illegal dumping of rubbish or unwanted items including garden waste.

If your waste is fly tipped by you or by someone else on your behalf, you could face a fixed penalty notice of up to  $\pounds400$ .

It is also classed as fly-tipping if you leave items:

beside street bins and recycling banks

on the floor of communal bin areas

outside closed recycling centres and charity shops

How you can prevent fly-tipping

Everyone has a legal 'duty of care' to ensure their household or business waste is disposed of correctly. You can be prosecuted even if your waste is fly tipped by someone else on your behalf.

If it is your waste, it is your responsibility.

Always use a registered waste carrier to provide a skip and/or to collect your rubbish.

#### **Reporting fly-tipping**

Fly-tipping is illegal. If you witness someone fly-tipping, call the police on 999 and report it as a crime in progress. All instances of fly-tipping (whether you witnessed the fly-tipping take place or not) should be reported as Envirocrime to South Cambs District Council via the Reporting Tool on their website.

Any envirocrime which has been reported will be investigated - collection and clear up may not happen immediately while SCDC check the facts and work to deter future envirocrime.

Fly tipping on private land is the responsibility of the landowner to clear.

When you report the fly-tipping you must try to include the following:

Exact location

Date and time you discovered the fly-tipping

Details and photos of the items

If you witnessed fly-tipping in progress you should also report Vehicle's registration number and other identifying features such as colour and model

Description of the fly-tipper(s) and the direction they were travelling What can you do with your household waste?

Use your kerbside bin collection.

For larger items, use the Bulky Waste Collection service offered by South Cambs District Council. It costs £30 for them to take away up to 3 items and they will recycle as much as possible.

Use neighbourhood recycling banks or recycling centres

We hold 11 Parish Council meetings per year and in addition you will be required to become a member of one or more of our subcommittees (Amenities and Playing Fields, Village Hall, Planning) and will be able to get involved in working groups looking at specific projects if you wish.

### Nature Diary March by Holly Blue

I always think that 1st March, not 1st January, should be New Years Day. It is the first day of the meteorological spring,(astronomical spring starts on 20th March) and I feel the start of everything new, and makes everyone feel a bit more optimistic. The days are getting longer, buds are starting to show on the trees and flowers are appearing in the garden and countryside. Some days are starting to feel just a "wee bit warmer" as said by a certain weather presenter.

In the garden the soil is starting to warm up and its time to think about new planting. Some days, you can take a coffee break outside in a sheltered corner and enjoy the spring sunshine without getting chilled.

Little migrants such as the Chiff Chaff are starting to arrive after a long flight from Africa, their call echoing around the spring wood.



Spring is breeding time for Frogs and Toads and they will be heading for your garden ponds any day now.

Keep an eye out for Hedgehogs. As the days warm up they will be coming out of hibernation.

Red Admiral and Brimstone butterflies that have overwintered in sheltered places such as garden sheds and greenhouses can be seen on the wing. Such a welcome sight.



The Blackthorn Bush is one of the first to flower. Their blossom appears before the leaves, but they are best known for the inky dark fruits produced in the Autumn that make delicious Sloe Gin.



There is a Rookery in the wood near the allotments and February/March time is the when they start nest building. Rooks breed in colonies high up in the trees, sometimes numbering several hundred pairs. Their nests are made of twigs broken from trees or stolen from other nests. Rooks are very raucous and one of the collective nouns for them is a Parliament of Rooks. It says it all really.



You cannot talk about Wildlife in March without mentioning the Hare. Hares are becoming scarce caused by a change in farming methods and hunting. We are lucky in Cambridgeshire as it one of the strongholds for Hares who like arable farmland and edges of woodland. They shelter in "forms" which are small depressions in the ground. When disturbed they can been seen zig zagging across the fields and can reach up to 40 miles per hour. If you are lucky hares can be spotted in March chasing around and "boxing", earning them the title of Mad March Hares. It is really uninterested females fending off the unwanted attention of amorous males.

Enjoy your Spring walks, there is so much to see this time of year, something new everyday, and it. makes you feel better.

#### Nigel di Castiglione ... Team Rector Freedom

The Prime Minister's 'cautious roadmap' that hopes to see the end of social distancing by June 21st has changed the mood of many. Signs of spring are appearing, hopes rising we can start to do normal things again. Freedom is in the air!

But what do we mean by 'freedom'? Clearly it not just doing what we want when we want and how we want; especially if that puts others and ourselves at risk. Whatever we make of the past year's lockdowns and climate of uncertainty fear and loss, we have come to realise there is an important place for right and proper constraints to be in place if true freedom is to be enjoyed, protected and shared.

I recall once talking to someone describing a close a relative as someone who 'had his own demons'. I suspect we all know the sort of thing that phrase implies even if we can't say whether this person had an affliction or chose responses to various circumstances in their own way. Whatever the explanation or underlying causes, I suspect the impact affected not just the individual but a wider group of family, friends and acquaintances; and curtailed all sorts of 'freedom', even if it was not much more than always feeling one was 'walking on eggshells' around this person.

The offer of freedom is at the heart of Christian belief and experience. There is a real irony in realising it required the arrest, torture, false accusations and horrible execution of Jesus. He gave up his freedom so that we could be set free. Hence the central importance of the resurrection when he was freed from death and triumphed over all he had endured in such a spectacular way.

Lent is the period when Christians prepare to celebrate the events of Holy week, Good Friday and Easter. This year the events and services we can hold to mark these pivotal moments in human history will still be subject to many constraints. However, what remains undiminished is the confidence and proclamation that Jesus died for our sins and was raised to life so that we could free from the burden of sin as well as the power of sin over us, and be fully restored to an unfettered relationship with God; with all the attendant benefits and ramifications for all our other relationships. This has very practical implications.

Here are two important examples. We all know how human behaviour and the defence of our so-called freedoms is causing devastation damage to the environment. We also know we need COVID vaccines to be available to all people around the world. Such important issues demand elements of sacrifice and service of others if we are to ensure we remain free to enjoy the world God has placed us in and ensure it is a good place for subsequent generations to steward after us. These are, I believe, Christian imperatives and about being fully free human beings

Jesus said: 'You shall know the truth and the truth shall set you free." (John 8v32)



## Road Map out of Lockdown






