Winter Landscape

'I leant upon a coppice gate When Frost was spectre-grey, And Winter's dregs made desolate The weakening eye of day.'

These are the first lines of Thomas Harry's poem: 'The Darkling Thrush', first published on 28 December 1900. The poet looks out at the countryside and reflects on the cold and gloom of a winter's evening, the tangled stems, the land's sharp features, the bleak twigs. It is a description of the winter landscape and becomes what Hardy expects for the year and century ahead. A feeling of misgiving, something we might also feel in January, especially with the continuing worries of Covid!

But, take heart, the poet hears the unexpected song of an elderly thrush who has chosen 'to fling his soul upon the growing gloom'.

It is some 'blessed hope' of which the poet is unaware. We might look out for such signs and sounds of hope in the coming weeks and months.

A visit to the woods and trees on a bright winter's day can be a wonderful sight and a welcome distraction to any cares we might have. The skeleton outline of branches and twigs stands out clear and mysterious against the sky, free from last year's clothing of leaves. Evergreen trees show their majestic presence and bulk in the grounds of Papworth Hall, looking like giant party cakes with an icing sugar dusting of white frost.

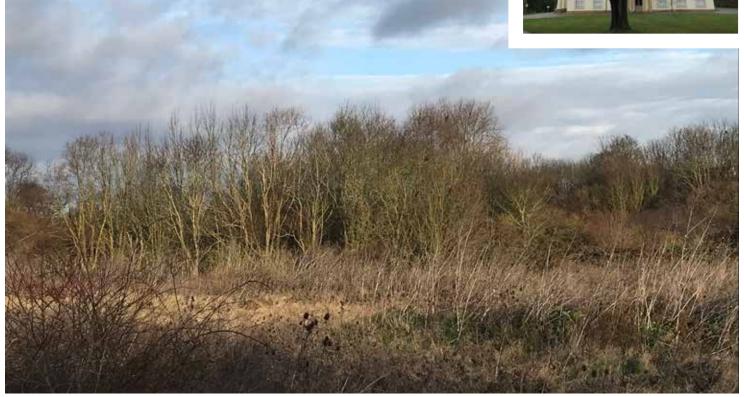
If the weather is too cold or wet, or the puddles too muddy and deep, travel to the woods in your imagination. Fly up to the highest branches and down to the deepest roots! In your mind's eye - chase the climbing squirrels, sit with the noisy rooks, snuggle down with secretive badgers.

Listen out for the song of the hopeful thrush, the chatter of small birds in the hedgerows, the hard bark of the muntjac and the distant, breathy hoot of the owl.

Happy New Year to you all. I hope you have the opportunity to enjoy our winter landscape this month.

...and a happy new year!

We may have sung it; it was said in many cards and no doubt the words will be on our lips as we meet people for the first time in 2022. But what do we mean by it; or is it just a phrase that slips off the tongue lacking any real thought or sentiment?

A happy new year for some will be a good report from a hospital visit, finding a new job, being able to book a holiday

with confidence it won't be cancelled, eventually getting together with family and friends. Perhaps 2022 will be a time when we say it with new intent, more genuine feeling and sincerity after such a torrid and turbulent time over the past 21 months; or is this still too much wishful thinking as the omicron strain of covid takes its toll?

Much of what we mean by happiness is caught up in circumstances and relationships; many of us seem to have an addiction to looking for the next experience whilst others feel trapped in a cycle of ongoing woe. (That's an observation not a criticism!)

Christians think a lot about peace. It means more than the absence of conflict! We don't have a monopoly on the word, but we can offer a distinctive understanding of what it looks like, feels like and how it translates into our lives

For example, when Jesus appeared after his resurrection the Bible reports his friends were behind locked doors, fearful for what might come next. Jesus's first words were: 'Peace be with you.' He did not change their circumstances, but he meant them to be different in the midst of what they were facing and for what might follow. The reason was he was indicating they could find God's peace; in other words, they could access God's nature and perspective on what was happening and, as a result, be full of peace.

The everyday word in Jesus' day was 'shalom'. It remains a common greeting among his native people today. In one part of the Bible, we are told of city walls being rebuilt; when the last stone was put in place the wall is described as being 'shalom', at peace and ready to meet the challenges facing the people living in its curtilage.

I hope very much 2022 will be a truly happy year. However, I would rather happiness be dwarfed by God's peace, divine 'shalom' breaking into your life. It is a bigger concept with bigger consequences and bigger benefits.

So, if like many, you start the new year with a set of NY's resolutions here is one I can commend: begin each day saying something like 'God, show me how to live in YOUR peace today.'

You may or may not feel you are a Christian, but, I believe such a prayer is one God is delighted to answer. He does this by showing us more and more of what Jesus was about and why we have just celebrated his birth at Christmas

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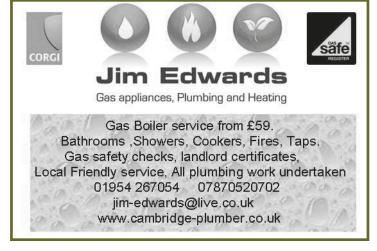














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News Update

Papworth Trust's tips to reduce condensation and mould in your home

Condensation occurs mainly during cold weather & is caused by steam or water vapour turning to water on cold surfaces. It is like an invisible bubble of water that is moving around, trying to find a way out through a window or air vent. If it hits a cold surface the bubble bursts causing condensation which can lead to mould.

The picture below gives an idea of the amount of extra water you add to the air in your home just by taking a shower or boiling a kettle



How can you help improve the situation?

- Heating ideally you should heat the whole home to a consistent temperature, do not have really hot or really cold rooms.
- Ventilation this is essential if condensation is to be controlled.
 Open windows during cooking, a bath or shower, or if the glass is misted up. This will let out moisture but do not let rooms get too cold. If trickle vents are fitted to windows leave these open.
- 3. Moisture reduction dry clothes outside where possible, make sure tumble dryers are vented properly, close bathroom & kitchen doors when bathing & cooking & open windows in those rooms to disperse the moisture, keep lids on saucepans whilst cooking to reduce steam.

RE-PLAY PAPWORTH



Happy new year to all. Planned building works at Play Papworth HQ (not at the Courtyard) mean we are not going to be able to run the Sunday afternoon vinyl sessions in the Courtyard café for a while. Here are a couple of recommended music shows to watch at home in the meantime.

'Get Back', shown in three parts (each of over two hours), documents The Beatles - you might have heard of them recording Let It Be during sessions at Twickenham, Apple Corps, and the rooftop concert at Savile Row. These follow a narrative arc as the band get together in early 1969 to write and record an album and to prepare for a (swiftly abandoned) live concert. The first episode drags, as the sound stage at Twickenham is obviously not an environment conducive to creativity, and guitarist George walks out after a few days. For episode two, they decamp to the basement of the Apple Corps offices in Savile Row. Most of the songs are completed here, especially when organist Billy Preston joins. Episode three shows the thrilling rooftop performance and album recording sessions. I came away with a renewed appreciation - geniuses they might have been, but they certainly put the work in. Top marks to the Abbey Road engineers who turned the Savile Row basement into a recording studio over a single weekend. Star of the show is Beatles roadie Mal Evans, one typical example being during the rehearsals for Maxwell's Silver Hammer: "Mal, could you get hold of a Blacksmith's anvil while we go for lunch?"

McCartney 3,2,1 is a six-part series co-presented by Paul McCartney (he used to the in The Beatles – you might have heard of them) and record producer Rick Rubin. Each half-hour episode features interviews, archive, live performance, and the stories behind the songs.

'Summer Of Soul (...Or, When the Revolution Could Not Be Televised)' documents the 1969 Harlem Cultural Festival, held over six weekends in Mount Morris Park, New York. Forty hours of footage were shot and left gathering dust in a basement for 45 years. The two-hour film includes performances by Stevie Wonder, Mahalia Jackson, Nina Simone, The 5th Dimension, The Staple Singers, Gladys Knight & the Pips, Blinky Williams, Sly & the Family Stone and the Chambers Brothers. It certainly looks a lot more fun than the mud and rain of 1969's other filmed music festival at Woodstock.

All of the above can be accessed on the Disney+ streaming service (£7.99 per month, which can be cancelled at any time). Look out for special offers, I got an introductory month for only £1.99.

Let's hope we can all get together in early Spring to hear the Let It Be album on vinyl. There's also talk of the Summer Of Soul soundtrack coming out on vinyl, too. Until then... keep healthy, support your local record shops, our equipment provider Criterion Audio, and the Courtyard café.

Gardening and bread making are both activities that have seen a huge interest since the beginning of the pandemic. How many people have heard some friends extolling the magic of sourdough bread making? Garden novices proudly show off their peonies or carrots. These nurture a positive mindset and can offset some of the difficulties experienced by WFH, (working from home), or being furloughed. Uncertainty is the enemy of our equilibrium. This is why any one of the activities mentioned can help us gain some equilibrium.

There are lots of you out there, who are stitching, knitting, quilting and crocheting. Give a thought to joining the Papworth Craft Group once meetings resume. Come and show off your pandemic projects and check us out. Meet others who are passionate about creating special items as well as more modest projects. Come and learn a new craft, or get help with a project that has gone awry for some reason.

PAPWORTH TENNIS CLUB NEWS

We hope all our Club members had an enjoyable Christmas and are ready for tennis in the New Year!

The amazing news for 2022 is that we shall be resurfacing the courts fairly soon – the work is being planned for late February, but only if the weather conditions are right. The contractors will be carrying out repairs to the existing tarmac surface to ensure a completely level playing area, laying down a modern artificial surface, and then edging the new courts.
