#### Play Area / Paddling Pool

We are hoping to have the paddling pool ready for use for the start of the summer holidays.

As in previous years, temporary toilets will be sited at the play area for convenience.

With the high numbers of people using the paddling pool a huge amount of rubbish will be generated. Please use the rubbish bins at the play area or ideally take your rubbish home with you - please do not leave nappies in the bins!

We ask that everyone does their bit to ensure the pool it is clean and safe for everyone to use and enjoy. Do not allow children covered in mud and dirt to go in the pool – debris and silt can easily block the filters. Please could we also request that children do not eat food whilst in the pool or in the area immediately round the poolside and that all food scraps are disposed of and not allowed to get into the water as food debris can easily get caught in the filtration system.

Please remember that young children should be supervised when in the paddling pool.

The paddling pool attracts families from far and wide, many of whom travel by car which can add to the parking problems on Ermine Street North and Varrier Jones Drive. If you are planning a visit the paddling pool why not leave the car at home and walk?

We would request that people who do drive park with consideration for other motorists, do not cause an obstruction and park within the rules of the Highway Code. The new car park area adjacent to the new Pavilion and Tennis Courts is also available to use.

#### **Overhanging Hedges & Trees**

Cambridgeshire County Council's Highways Department have asked me to remind householders that hedges and trees should not be allowed to encroach onto the public highway.

Vegetation is growing rapidly and can very quickly cause problems for pedestrians when it starts to encroach the public footpaths. This is particularly an issue for wheelchair users and parents with children in prams and buggies, when twigs can be at face height and easily cause scratches.

The owner or occupier of a property has a legal responsibility (Highways Act 1980 s154) to ensure that the 'public highway' adjacent to a property is not obstructed by vegetation from their property. The public highway is defined by law as consisting of any verge, footway, bridleway or footpath that is maintained at public expense and over which the public has right of way.

Local Authorities have a legal duty to ensure that public highways are unobstructed, and often receive complaints from members of the general public, so try to inspect roads regularly.

When Local Authorities become aware of such obstructions, they can issue a formal notice for the work to be undertaken, which, if ignored will result in the Local Authority undertaking the work and charging their costs back to the owner/occupier.

If your hedge is a starting to get a bit unruly, with twigs and branches sticking out towards the pavement, now is the time to get those shears and hedge trimmers out and get trimming to help keep our pathways clear and unobstructed!

When undertaking work on garden hedges check that there are no birds nesting, as it is an offence under the Wildlife & Countryside Act 1981 to damage or destroy the nest of any wild bird while it is in use or being built.

## **Tree Warden Report**

I heard the other day, on the radio, how oak trees in a wood can travel uphill! The acorns produced by oaks are heavy seeds and will usually roll downhill when they fall to the ground. However, acorns are also a favourite food treat of the Jay who collect and bury huge numbers of these snacks in the autumn. They store the acorns in this way for their winter

pantry but, of course, they do not retrieve every acorn that is buried and these forgotten treasures often germinate and in time produce oak saplings, sometimes uphill from their parent tree. I am sure forgetful squirrels also perform a similar service to help spread the population of oak trees.

The acorn itself has an interesting history. Acorns were used as a source of food, before grains were developed. In mythology and Norse legend they are associated with Thor, who sheltered from the storm under a mighty oak. Some people in Scandinavia today place acorns on their windowsills to protect them from lightening. The shape of the acorn is a delight for the decorative arts and is used, with the oak leaf, as the symbol for the National Trust.

We recently had to say goodbye to an old friend at the corner of

the churchyard. It was a very large ash tree that has stood there for many years, weathering the seasons and once, at least, dropping a large heavy branch on the grave stones below after a particularly stormy night. Unfortunately, disease caught up with the tree and it had to be felled before it became a hazard to public safety. On the brighter side, the church is now more visible from the north.

The next letter in my tree alphabet is 'B', and, in this Platinum Jubilee year, I want to focus on the fine Beech tree planted by the Queen in the grounds of Papworth Hall on 28th May 1962.

The royal family has made a number of visits to Papworth over the years, to see the early work

of the tuberculosis clinic and settlement and then to support and recognise the growing importance of the Papworth heart hospital. What better way to mark the work and dedication of such pioneers in our health services than for the Queen to plant a tree that has now grown into such a healthy and beautiful specimen for us all to admire.



It is a great shame that the plaque at the base of the tree, recording this event, can no longer be clearly read. A new plaque should be put in its place.

To identify a beech tree, look for:

- Oval leaves around 4-9cm long with a pointed tip and wavy edges
- Smooth grey bark, often with slight horizontal etchings
- Tassel-like male catkins hanging from long stalks
- Female flowers hanging in pairs, surrounded by a cup
- Triangular beech nuts, known as beech masts, in prickly seed




Beech trees provide important food and habitat for wild life. The bark is often home to a variety of fungi, mosses and lichens and it's seeds are eaten by mice, voles, squirrels and birds.

## Don't delay what needs fixing day!



Snippets of social media or gossip in some newspapers indicates that, for all the joy over the Queen's platinum jubilee celebrations, significant tensions abound in relationships between some of the 'royals'. They are human beings who face challenges and stresses familiar to us all. At the same time, the absence of family brings a host of other problems – loneliness, isolation, who to seek help from in times of need or frailty being just a few. The contrast ought to be a salutary reminder to those with family to treasure who we have and

make this an incentive to mend fences and build bridges when problems erupt. We all know this is easier said than done, as current international events remind us.

People of faith are not excluded or cossetted by their belief in God; it is not long before we come up against other people of faith who see the same issues we wrestle with from a different perspective and with a different set of core beliefs. This summer such tensions may be on view among Anglican Christians. The Archbishop of Canterbury has invited Anglican bishops from around the world to a conference being held during July in Canterbury. Already some have declined the invitation and others are sharpening their political weapons. See how these Christians love one another! It may not be pretty; it may seem largely irrelevant to many. Equally, it could be an event that ends up being an occasion for healing, growing mutual understanding and respect and offering some much-needed reflection to a world teetering on the edge of disaster over climate change and other global issues. One of the mistakes I notice, when people disagree, is the desire to hide behind a mindset that says, in effect, 'You've not heard me unless you agree with what I think and feel ...' Unless we move beyond that sentiment the barrier usually grows, the hurt deepens and the opportunity for reconciliation becomes more remote.

My first boss (in the real world!) volunteered some advice to me just 2 days before Annie and I were married. Over a cup of coffee, he told me succinctly he got married in the late 1950s, had children in the '60s, got divorced and remarried in the early '70s ..." because all our friends were doing it then ...". He told me his second wife was a much nicer person than his first and clearly they were happy together; but with tears in his eyes the advice was, 'Nigel, if you get married, stay married.' He was echoing pain he knew first-hand - how some decisions have irrevocable outcomes that can outweigh the issues between us; especially looked at again with hindsight.

Today (as I write) the news on TV is of the 5th anniversary of the Grenfell disaster and the 40th anniversary of the ending of war in the Falklands; both were terrible in terms of the loss of life and the ongoing and still unresolved traumas for so many directly involved – including the inability of some to come together, to re-unite, forgive, say sorry and rebuild. For some being locked years later is down to the decisions of others they can't alter or influence, which makes such things matters for society as a whole. 'Don't let the sun go down on your anger ...' wrote St Paul in one of his letters. Christians may be just as bad as others when we fall out, misbehave and hurt others by accident or intentionally. We have a bigger narrative from which to offer hands of healing and reconciliation, open to all if we are ready to use them; even if sometimes we are not good enough at practicing what we preach!



Both 'drops' of Record Store Day 2022 are now over. This year RSD was again split into two, not by a virus this time, but by reduced capacity in the record manufacturing plants. 500,000 vinyl copies of last year's Adele album were pressed worldwide, which created a huge backlog, and only about half of them were sold. RSD seemed a bit smaller-scale than previous years and there are already bargains to be had.

The big news in music comes from Blondie – always a popular request for Sunday afternoons - who, four years after first announcing it, finally release their 'Against The Odds 1974-1982' box set at the end of August. 10 LPs, 10" and 7" singles, two 12" books (totalling 264 pages), 124 tracks (36 previously unreleased), all remastered at Abbey Road. ## South Cambridgeshire District Council Caxton and Papworth Ward

District Councillor's Monthly Report - July 2022



#### **Blocked Drains on Ermine Street**

A Papworth resident helpfully sent me several images of the blocked drains along Ermine Street. Although these have been reported to the County Council previously, the Highways department had taken no action. I passed the pictures to Mandy Smith, our County Councillor, with a request that Highways look again at these drains and they

have promised an inspection visit shortly.

#### East West Rail and the Arc

Councillors representing the wards that might be affected by East West Rail (EWR) received another briefing from the company earlier this month. They provided lots of information but not the key pieces that everyone is still waiting for – the route alignment and the location of the stations. If you are interested in learning more about their progress or want to speak to the project team, they have a drop-in event on Wednesday 20th July, 2pm to 8pm at The Cambridge Belfry, Back Lane, Cambourne, CB23 6BW.

EWR will run within the Oxford-Cambridge Arc, which also includes Bedford and Milton Keynes. Responsibility for the Arc has now moved to a "levelling up" minister whereas in the past it has been a housing minister. This appears to be a signal that the Arc is now about economic growth and no longer about more houses. Council leaders in the area are discussing the possibility of entering into a Pan Regional Partnership (PRP) between councils, universities and the private sector to deliver strategic improvements within the Arc.

#### **Cost of Living Payments**

The government has announced another round of grants to assist households across the whole of the UK with the soaring cost of living. Qualifying low income households will receive £650 in two instalments. The first instalment will start to be paid directly into bank accounts from the 14 July. The second instalment of £324 will be paid in the autumn.

#### **Planning**

The Planning Committee has met for the first time since the election and has begun working through applications that have accumulated in the last few months. None of the applications discussed relate to Caxton and Papworth ward.

Separately, Northstowe's lack of facilities are being addressed. The district council has acquired three houses from the developers to use as temporary community facilities, pending a start on the construction of permanent facilities. Financing of the latter is providing a headache as the amounts estimated earlier are now insufficient in light of recent steep increases in the cost of materials and labour.

#### Climate Emergency

The Climate Emergency Advisory Committee (CEAC) has also met for the first time since the election. As its name suggests, CEAC guides the district-wide strategies on environmental issues. To date, most of its work has related to SCDC's own activities, for example, procuring a small number of electric bin lorries to trial. This trial was deemed a success and the remaining diesel bin lorries will be replaced with electric ones as they reach end of life. South Cambs Hall has been retrofitted with solar panels and a ground source heat pump, and it will be interesting to see how efficient that is once winter arrives. Overall carbon emissions have fallen 13% in the last

year, despite the district's population increasing by 2%.

The council is now moving on to improving the environmental efficiency of the buildings it owns, with particular focus on residential properties.

Less progress has been made in facilitating the installation of public chargers for electric vehicles. In fact, to the best of my knowledge, there are no public chargers at all in Caxton and Papworth ward. Are you prevented from acquiring an electric car because you cannot install a private charger, for example, because you live in a flat or have only on-street parking? If so, drop me an email and if we can demonstrate significant need, we may be able to make progress.

Parishes will be encouraged to declare a climate emergency in their villages. An informational web page and tool kit are being developed, and I will share the details when they are released.

SCDC has also developed its own interim protocol for Biodiversity Net Gain. National regulations will eventually be brought into law but not until late next year at the earliest. The interim protocol will allow parishes to hold developers to account and consider biodiversity on their sites in the meantime.

#### **Community Chest**

South Cambs has provided a Community Chest fund for a number of years. This is grant funding available to voluntary and community sector groups, charities and public sector bodies wishing to further improve quality of life in South Cambridgeshire. Up to £2000 may be applied for by an organisation in a single financial year. #### Fair Tax Foundation

Several councillors have been contacted by residents concerned that the district council may be placing work with businesses that have connections with offshore tax havens. Whilst legal, profit shifting under such arrangements artificially distorts and typically reduce taxes paid in this country. As part of its procurement process for contracts above £25k, South Cambs District Council looks at the supplier's accounts and checks that they are recorded as paying tax. Where an anomaly is present, a finance officer will follow up with the company to clarify the situation. The council has also contacted the Fair Tax Foundation to find out more about its accreditation scheme with a view to submitting an application to join.
