The Papworth Craft Group is busy making all kinds of things knitted, crocheted, cross stitched and lace made. It is so excitingc to welcome new faces to the group, including some very young, who want to learn to knit or crochet. There is no need for anyone, but especially our younger members, to spend the full two hours with the group. The key is to stay for as long as you are finding it fun and, for novices, who wish to spend longer learning the craft they have chosen. We have had four young ladies drop by, who are learning to crochet, and another learning to knit. Hopefully, they will be thrilled with their progress and inspired to make a small item, to demonstrate how much they have learned.

Crafters like to learn from other crafters. There might be an exciting new yarn that someone has discovered, an interesting book to recommend or to show the group a work in progress or a completed project.

Learning a completely new craft can be a little daunting. Lace making certainly falls within the daunting category. There are now two lacemakers in the group both willing to demonstrate their craft and invite anyone to have a go. Watching an experienced lacemaker at work is so impressive, but definitely reinforced the belief that 'it is not for us'. However, two group members took up the challenge to try it out, watched and aided by the experienced lacemaker. There are so many bobbins to tame! And you need to use them all. Once you have a very tenuous grip on the principal involved concerning the bobbins and their prescribed order of use, it is time to engage with them! Terrifying! Once you have reached the end of a row, one's work is not done. The bobbins lie on a rounds firm cushion. At the top of this there is the pattern pinned. This is where the lace 'grows' and at the end of each row, the lace is secured with a pin on top of the pattern 'diagram'. Apologies if this is sounding complicated! It was very special to have a lesson from both our lacemakers. Each of them had slightly different tips and that was a interesting, demonstrating that there is a place for developing individual tips for oneself. It is not difficult to see that lacemaking is an addictive craft, even if it is slow going at the start. If you are interested in lacemaking and would like to see what is involved, join us at the next meeting on 5 November.

With Christmas coming and the evenings are longer, it is a good time to think about gifts and decorations to make. There is no end of choice when it comes to knitting or crocheting gifts. At present, there seems to be a craze for making socks. These make great gifts for Christmas. If you would like to learn how to make socks, we have at least two members of the group, who are experts at making socks. Look out for knitting kits

or go online to see what is available in terms of patterns and suggested yarns. Christmas Socks by West Yorkshire Spinners has some good patterns. Both woolwarehouse.co.uk and lovecrafts.com are excellent suppliers of yarns, patterns and all kinds of needlework necessities.

In past years we have asked for squares that are then made into blankets for charity. If you would like to knit or crochet squares they should be 20 cm x 20 cm (8 inches x 8 inches). Please sew in all the ends. Knitting or crocheting a square or two can be quite therapeutic, or a good thing to do between projects. Hats and scarves are needed over the winter, if you feel you would prefer to make something a little more challenging. Our yarn stash is in a healthy state at present. If you would like some for making squares, (or hats and scarves), please contact Rosalind Parnell at parnellrh@aol.com. Finished squares can be handed in to Nicola at Papworth Library, or brought to one of our Saturday meetings. Thank you for the gift of your time

Time to Remember

The year has flown by, so it seems; we are now starting to see poppy brooches or badges, gearing up to acknowledge the sacrifice of so many in the wars of the last 100+ years. 2022 has taken many of us by surprise - as we witness the horrific loss of lives in Ukraine have experienced the death of our monarch and the accession of our new King. Many families have lost loved ones much more privately and feel their absence equally

keenly. There is no uniform way of dealing with these things and the impact they have.

I remember conducting a funeral – about 15 years ago – where the daughters of the deceased couldn't face making a decision about what to do with their late Mum's cremated remains. I offered to look after them until they reached a decision; a little over 3 years passed before they were ready. In contrast, I have met families who simply want to get things over and behind them as decently and quickly as possible. There is no right or wrong approach to such events; grief and sorrow is not measured by how slowly or quickly the affairs of a deceased relative are brought to a suitable and agreed conclusion.

One of the challenges we face when a loved one dies (whether as the end of a long illness or a sudden and wholly unexpected accident etc) it comes as a shock and triggers the need for so many decisions in a short space of time. That's why a time to stop, remember, take stock and acknowledges the depth of loss can be so helpful; this may be on Remembrance Sunday, an anniversary, the first Christmas without the one we have lost at the table or whenever ... It is easy to forget or ignore how we are made to be active and to rest so that physically, emotionally and spiritually we are restored and able to live well.

The Bible records (in John 11) how Jesus was summoned to the bedside of a friend who was dying. When he reached the village, he was told his friend had died a few days earlier and been buried. Standing by the burial place Jesus wept. The writer of Ecclesiastes reminds us: 'For everything there is a time ... a time to be born, and a time to die ... a time to weep and a time to laugh ...' Dealing with the death of a relative or friend can include crying and laughter ...'Do you remember when ...?'

It is when we make time to stop, to remember, to acknowledge, to

honour, to be real and to share that healing can start to overcome the raw sense of loss; not forgetting calling to mind all that has happened and starting to find how God has weaved so much of His goodness into the fabric of our experiences. A particularly good example of this has been brought to our attention through 3 Dads walking - turning the acute loss and pain of each having lost a daughter in the last 3 years into a campaign to raise awareness of a problem often pushed to the background. They are forcing many others to stop, think, become aware and take actions likely to save and prolong many lives; such initiatives also remind us how loss and grief are often best faced together > if it takes a village to raise a family it also takes a community to comfort the bereaved.

Tree Warden Report

The bright October sunshine has shown up the autumn colours of our woodland, hedgerows and gardens to make a wonderful spectacle. Such a feast of yellows, reds, golds and browns in the trees and a carpet of different colours and patterns on the footpaths and pavements. It's the season of harvest as seeds, nuts and fruit have ripened

and come to maturity and we see the woodland wildlife collecting in their food stores for the winter season ahead. Squirrels, voles and mice gather up fallen acorns, nuts and fruit and store them away in various places, ready for eating on winter days when food is scarce.

Many birds also take advantage of the harvest of nuts, seeds, berries and fruit from trees and hedgerows at this time of year. The colourful Jay collects and hoards acorns, hiding them in nooks and under dead leaves. The Jay will return to these life-saving larders in the colder months of the year. It has been estimated that one Jay can store up to 5000 acorns in one season. Of course, they don't remember where every acorn has been hidden and so new seedlings appear and could grow into mighty oak trees themselves.

Mallard ducks swallow acorns whole. Other birds will also be keen to make the most of nature's bounty - beechmast and hazel nuts, mistletoe and holly berries for example. In this way plants, birds and animals in the natural world continue to co-exist.

My tree warden alphabet has reached the letter F, and F is for Fungi. The fruiting bodies of fungi are the visible evidence of the vast and intricate breakdown process which is happening all the time in our woodlands. Fungi not only appear on living trees as parasites, they are also active on dead and decaying matter as saprophyte, most of them playing an important part in the

book, which has been very entertaining.

Highlights of October included a "Let's Talk" game which involves cards with different subjects such as "What food do you dislike and breakdown of organic matter. Mycorrhizal fungi create a symbiotic relationship with plants, linking them together in vast networks above and below ground level. It is estimated that 90% of plants depend on these fungi.

There are several hundred wood-inhabiting fungi in Britain and most of them are remarkably selective in the conditions they demand for survival. Some need wet or even soggy conditions while some prefer the relative dryness of standing trees.

The terms 'mushroom' and 'toadstool' are loose and subjective rather than clearly defined distinctions. Although 'toadstool' is often referred to fungi that is poisonous and 'mushroom' more often used to define fungi that is edible, there is no biological or scientific difference between a toadstool and a mushroom.

Many fungi are harmless but it is always best to seek the advice of an expert before picking any in the wild. One particularly poisonous fungi is the Death Cap, which is fairly common in the British Isles. Even just a quarter of a Death Cap can be fatal to humans.

Another more beautiful, but also poisonous, fungi is the Fly Agaric which appears in autumn, often round birch trees or in coniferous woodland. These red capped mushrooms with white spots are

a firm favourite for the illustrators of fairy tales. The species gets its name from its former household use against flies. The caps used to be mashed up with milk and sugar and the mixture laid out as a bait to attract and kill flies.

So, as we travel together through November, look up at the trees as strong winds scatter their remaining leaves and look down at the woodland floor to discover (but do not touch) the amazing variety of mushrooms and toadstools.

Well done to the entire medical team and all the backroom staff who together made this possible. We are so fortunate that despite having to deal with unprecedented demand, staff absences and supply chain issues, our team has been able to bounce back strong following the Covid disruption.

A good way to keep abreast of what is going on at the surgery is to check out the website www.papworthsurgery.nhs.uk where announcements and information are regularly updated. For some time now the surgery has been offering evening appointments on Mondays and Wednesdays and since late summer we have had two new registrars join the team which has also helped to increase the number of appointments available.

The Pharmacy remains under particular pressure – please be sure to request repeat prescriptions in good time. Getting into the habit of giving a week's notice would be a good rule. Remember weekends and bank holidays are not working days for the staff in the pharmacy. Nationally it is reported that there is considerable waste of prescription medicine, which costs the NHS millions every year. Though changes in procedures in our surgery recently have addressed this problem to some extent, we all have a part to play in reducing the overall NHS drugs bill.

Buses

The public consultation of the Cambridge "Making Connections" proposal is now open. The scheme would introduce a Sustainable Travel Zone (STZ) and a greatly enhanced bus service across the county, funded by a congestion charge to drive into the city. You can respond to the consultation

online at http://www.greatercambridge.org.uk/mc-2022. The consultation is open until midday on 23rd December. In addition to the information online, there will be a variety of face-to-face events and webinars where you can obtain more information. Details are on the web site.

Separately, the current bus services that Stagecoach are withdrawing have been reassigned to other operators. The number 18 service to and from Cambridge will be operated by Whippet and continue to serve most of the villages on its current route. The route will also be extended to St Neots. Eltisley will now be served by an additional Whippet X3 service, which will divert between Papworth and Cambourne, once in the morning inbound and once in the evening outbound. Whippet also proposes to introduce a late evening service between Huntingdon and Cambridge via Papworth from mid-November. Check their timetable regularly for the current information.

Cost of Living Support

The first five Warm Hubs have opened their doors as part of a new initiative to support communities in South and East Cambridgeshire this winter. More villages will see Warm Hubs open their doors during November. Warm Hubs are run within community spaces, where residents can visit a safe, warm and friendly environment to enjoy refreshments and social activity, obtain information and advice. For more information and a list of current Warm Hubs, visit https://www.scambs.gov.uk/warm-hubs/.

Longer term, the Combined Authority is running a Sustainable Warmth scheme providing funding for households with a combined gross household income of less than £30,000 living in energy inefficient homes to help reduce their bills. Funding is available to households heated by a gas boiler connected to the mains gas grid (on-gas), and also to households heated by alternative fuels including electricity, oil, liquid propane gas, and solid fuels (off-gas).

Local installers will guide customers through the application, helping them understand and establish eligibility for the scheme. If eligible, the installer will identify which improvements for the home will provide the greatest benefits and arrange any necessary surveys and installations.
