The Library Presents has unveiled its highly anticipated spring programme, created with the input of over 570 local residents. The spring line-up is set to be one of the most exciting in the programme's six year history and features music, puppetry, dance, circus, theatre, and storytelling events.

PADDLING POOL ATTENDANTS REQUIRED – SUMMER HOLIDAYS

The Parish Council will be opening the paddling pool once again this summer following refurbishment of the pool and upgrade of the pumps and equipment which will be happening in April/May.

The paddling pool is a great asset to the village and well used each year by children from the village and from further afield.

We will need helpers to keep it running - without people to look after the pool, we would be unable to open it up for the summer. It takes a great deal of work to maintain the pool so it is safe and clean to use and keep the play area tidy.

We are hoping to employ 3 or 4 people to share cover of approximately 4-5 hours spread out over the day from early morning until early evening, 7 days a week, from mid-July until early September. The pool attendant is a paid position, and all necessary training will be provided.

OVERHANGING HEDGES & TREES

Cambridgeshire County Council's Highways Department have asked us to remind householders that hedges and trees should not be allowed to encroach onto the public highway.

As we move into spring, vegetation is growing rapidly and can very quickly cause problems for pedestrians when it starts to encroach the public footpaths. This is particularly an issue for wheelchair users and parents with children in prams and buggies, when twigs can be at face height and easily cause scratches.

The owner or occupier of a property has a legal responsibility (Highways Act 1980 s154) to ensure that the 'public highway' adjacent to a property is not obstructed by vegetation from their property. The public highway is defined by law as consisting of any verge, footway, bridleway or footpath that is maintained at public expense and over which the public has right of way.

Local Authorities have a legal duty to ensure that public highways are unobstructed, so usually inspect roads regularly and often receive complaints from members of the general public.

When Local Authorities become aware of such obstructions, they can issue a formal notice for the work to be undertaken, which, if ignored will result in the Local Authority undertaking the work and charging their costs back to the owner/occupier.

If your hedge is a starting to get a bit unruly, with twigs and branches sticking out towards the pavement, now is the perfect time of year, before the birds are nesting, to get those shears and hedge trimmers out and get trimming to help keep our pathways clear and unobstructed!

Issues such as overhanging hedges, bushes and trees or any other highways matters such as potholes, street signs, damage to street furniture and obstructions or debris and mud on the road can be reported online via the Cambridgeshire County Council

PLAY AREA & MUGA REFURBISHMENT

Work is due to start on the refurbishment of the play area and padding pool, and installation of new equipment from Tuesday 2 April.

You will have seen that the pool pump house has already been extended to accommodation the upgraded pump equipment.

The play area will be out of use once the contractors start to remove the old equipment and the access to the play area will be fenced off until the new equipment is ready to be used. Please do not access the play area during this time.

There are several other play areas in the village which can be used instead, including two on Summersfield, which have equipment for all ages.

Work on resurfacing and upgrading the Multi Use Games Area will happen towards the end of May - more details will be shared once confirmed.

The Highway Code is the UK's official guide to safe and responsible driving. According to Rule 243 of the Highway Code, you must not park or stop your vehicle:

Opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorized parking space.

In front of an entrance to a property.

These rules apply to all drivers, regardless of whether they are driving on public or private land. Spaces are available in the car park at the sports field or behind the shops.

Tenant Consultations – Planned Works Programme

In case you are thinking ...

In my world weddings baptisms and funerals come under the generic title of 'Life Events'. One of the privileges of the English parish system is your local church is to be on hand to meet and guide people through such significant decisions and times. The privilege is two sided - people who live in the parish have a right to ask for these special services and as a Christian minister. I have the responsibility to respond

and support these requests. Inevitably and sadly, these sort of 'Life Events' were put on hold when we were hit by COVID, largely because the need to keep people safe as well as the logistics being unusually challenging for families, individuals and the church. In the last few weeks, I have (happily) received an unexpected number of requests for christening or baptism. (The terms christening, or baptism, are, really interchangeable.) These have come from parents on behalf of their children and, in a couple of instances, from adults.

The patterns of what people expect and do has changed dramatically in the last half century. Whereas in the middle of the last century perhaps 4 out 5 children would be presented for christening within a year or so of being born, these days the numbers are only about 1 in 10. Therefore, when requests come, they become extra special occasions for the local church; because people have made a conscious decision to buck the trend. I usually ask people why they have chosen christening for their children. The answers are fascinating, because what you are saying and thinking interests me! For some, it's what their family does; for others, it is a good way to gather close family and friends to celebrate the gift of a new life; and for some it is the heartfelt desire to set the upbringing of their children within a clearly Christian framework. For many there is no one answer - it can be some combination of all 3 put together!

When an adult asks to be baptised. I find it could because they feel they missed out if they weren't christened as a child; or because something has happened to initiate a more conscious interest in spiritual matters. For some, there is also a feeling they want something they are actively aware of and choose rather than relying on what was done for them by their loving parents. Whilst the Christian tradition is, by-and-large, that christening or baptism is something done once, there are things we can do (including with water involved) that are profound and help overcome that

feeling some have - for example, "I am told I was there but I would like something to remember about why being a Christian matters to me." When an adult asks me for baptism, I usually ask them whether they want a simple sprinkling at the font or would prefer an occasion where there is a pool in which they can be fully immersed. Both are equally valid and part of our repertoire! Our contribution as the local church is to help people find a pathway that is right for them within our overall Christian understanding. Maybe this is the time for some to do 'catch-up' in 2024. If so, we would love to hear from you!

Hmm ... I remembered what I thought about this when I was small.

I didn't feel I had sinned really. Ok, I was no rount reel had sinned really. Or, I was no goody two shoes by a long way; but I didn't see whatever I had done wrong required Jesus to die on a cross on my behalf. Far be it for me to take issue with St Paul but... really? Perhaps he should stick to speaking for himself. After all it was him doing all the persecuting, not me!

As an adult, having now managed some decent As an adult, inaving now inanged some decent sinning, I see this slightly differently. But more because I realise how it's nigh impossible for anyone of us to live well without having a negative impact on someone else (think climate change, capitalism, wars etc).



Sin is ingrained in the human experience and it's impossible for any of us to totally avoid it - just think where your pension funds are invested for example

But I also remembered what farmers do when they need to get an orphaned lamb adopted. They wipe the orphan with the scent of another lamb and its mother, and this results in her not noticing the extra mouth to feed, the extra body to look after, is not one of her own

For me that's Grace – whether we see ourselves as culpable or not, humans, by definition, cannot match the perfection of God. The Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ is what covers us so that God doesn't notice. God sees us as his. May the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ cover you this month

Everywhere there is growth and renewal in our gardens, streets, countryside and woodland. Increased light levels, more

warmth and the gentle spring rain all help to 'waken up' the plants, shrubs and trees around the village. Look out for the enormous sticky buds on the chestnut trees and the fresh green 'flush' of new leaves on our hedgerows.

In April, look out for agile swallows returning from their South African winter holiday. Later in the month we will see bluebells and wild garlic in the woods and clumps of cow parsley on road verges and field edges, adding their frilly white beauty to the countryside scene.

I have been looking at the Tree Council website (treecouncil. org.uk). They have a number of campaigns through the year to encourage people to care for and enjoy trees. Their campaign for April is entitled 'Let's Celebrate Spring!'.

The website has an introduction to 'forest bathing'. It is described as taking a mindful stroll through nature to boost your health and wellbeing. They say forest bathing has been shown to reduce stress, improve mood and even boost our immune systems. Spending time in nature can help us feel more connected and appreciative of the world around us. There is an audio clip to explain this more fully.

My Tree Warden alphabet has arrived at the tricky letter 'v'. It is going to be v for 'vista'. A vista is a 'framed view' that accentuates the landscape's best qualities. By using plants and built structures to manage what you can see of the full view, you can make it appear much more appealing, hide any detracting bits, or make it seem further away.

The famous landscape gardener, Lancelot Capability Brown, was a master at creating sweeping vistas, using clusters of trees, strategically placed to open up panoramic scenes to showcase the beauty of the surrounding countryside. Brown was not only a talented landscape gardener but also a very successful entrepreneur with influential client landowners up and down the country. He owned property in Cambridgeshire and was buried in the churchyard of St. Peter and St. Paul, the parish church of Brown's small estate at Fenstanton Manor.

There are many examples of Capability landscapes to be visited and enjoyed, several of them in National Trust ownership. For example, Wimpole Hall, where Brown's North Park, created in the 1760s and 1770s provides an idyllic setting for the hall and features an extraordinary focus in the form of a picturesque Gothic folly. Other nearby Capability landscapers include the Ashridge Estate in Hertfordshire and the Woburn Estate in Bedfordshire.

In Papworth, we have the tree lined avenue up to Papworth Hall and the almost complete line of alder trees each side of School Walk. In your garden you might use arches or tree planting to create your own local vistas.

Easter has passed and spring has finally sprung. The Papworth Craft Group seeks to bring likeminded crafters together, to spend two hours, twice a month, for an uninterrupted time relaxing with knitting, crochet, cross stitch or any other portable craft that is being worked on at any one time. It is an opportunity to see what other crafters are doing, to learn from one another and to show what has been progressed or finished since previous meetings. Membership is totally flexible: turn up as frequently as you like for as long as you like. Just come for a chat. We would love to meet you. If you would like to learn to knit, crochet or cross stitch, bring your materials with you and we can get your started. Want to learn but no materials to work with? Contact Rosalind Parnell at parnellrh@aol.com in advance of a meeting and there will be all you need, ready and waiting for you to make a start.

The ongoing charity project of making blankets out of knitted and crocheted squares has been well supported. Bags of squares have been left at the library from knitters, who do not attend group meetings, but have been more than happy to knit squares. Lockdown was an especially productive time! Similarly, appeals for yarn to keep our stash going have received a generous response. It has been heartwarming. If you like to do a bit of knitting, but do not want a project on the go through the gardening months, producing squares would fit the bill. Squares should be 20 cm x 20 cm, (8 inches x 8 inches), with all the ends sewn in, please. The corner to corner method of making the squares is very efficient. If you would like some yarn, please contact Rosalind, (address above). Our stash is reasonably healthy at present. Thinking ahead and for the more ambitious, hats and scarves of all sizes are quick to make and will be much needed, once the colder weather arrives. Carole Watt can crochet hats in her sleep. She uses up stash yarn by making striped hats and they are very jolly. Tina Carter has knitted some darling hats for little people and Andrea Rowland has made some gorgeous, knitted accessories for adults.

It has been amazing to see the progress Linda Jewsbury has made with crocheting after her devastating fractures to her right arm. Her accident and subsequent surgery left her unable to do even basic tasks. The problem was made worse, because it was her dominant right hand that was affected. Some months ago, Linda made a start with a 10mm crochet hook and some chunky yarn, managing only a couple of stitches at a time. Those stitches became a blanket and she has added a cushion to her list of finished projects. She is awaiting more surgery, but is hopeful that she will regain even more dexterity. Linda has demonstrated what courage and determination can achieve. Once she has recovered from her surgery, she will no doubt set her sights on larger projects.

A note on seasonal yarn. Now that winter is well and truly behind us, crafters can confidently put aside chunky yarns and seek out more lightweight materials for their projects. The choice of yarns is so vast that it pays to have an idea for your requirements, in terms of the composition of the yarn as well as the weight. At the more cost effective end of the spectrum are the synthetic fibres. The ubiquitous one is acrylic. This hardwearing yarn comes in aran, double knit 4 ply and 3 ply. Sometimes it is mixed with polyester or nylon and it tolerates all manner of assaults on it through wear and tear and laundering. Being synthetic, acrylic is ideal for those who are allergic to wool and other natural fibres that can also irritate the skin, such as mohair and angora. When knitting or crocheting garments for babies and little people with delicate skin, using a soft, synthetic yarn is a wise choice,

especially when the item is for a gift. Look out for premium acrylic yarns, as they feel soft to the touch but are still as forgiving. Natural fibres, on the whole, are great to work with. Cotton varn is a great choice for spring and summer projects and comes in a range of weights. Cotton works well for most garments, although a wool cotton yarn, (usually in a 50-50 mix), produces a beautiful drape and is soft to the touch. A silk-mohair mix such as Kid Silk Haze by Rowan is as light as a feather as great for shawls or garments. Natural fibres mostly attract a higher price tag, although there are bargains to be found, such as discontinued colours of more expensive brands or the range of yarns by Drops. Inspiration is everywhere and ideas for projects can be found online and in craft magazines. It has been noted here before that the library has a good range of craft books and it is well worth taking a look. If making a garment is too time consuming, there are plenty of other projects to consider for the spring and summer. Shawls can be very straightforward and once the pattern is fixed in your head, it is easy to complete in a reasonable period of time. The humble granny square can form the building blocks to many things. Bags made out of crocheted granny squares can be very effective as well as covers for tablets, laptops, books...let your imagination fly.

The Papworth Library hosts a variety of activities throughout the year. The Papworth Craft Group is one of them. Library staff have generously permitted us to occupy the library on two Saturdays every month. At times there is a lot of chatter and laughing, but we have not been asked to leave yet!! If you think you would like to join, drop in on either the first or third Saturday of the month.

Enjoy the longer days of April, as everything in nature welcomes the Spring!

Local Elections

Local elections are scheduled to take place across the country on Thursday 2nd May. In South Cambridgeshire, there are no council elections, but there is a ballot for the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC). For this reason, the council entered a pre-election period on Tuesday 26th March and this runs until the close of polls on 2nd May. For the most part, it will be "business as usual" at the council but there may

be a few activities deemed political that staff will not be able to address until May.







Polling cards and postal votes will be mailed out over the next few weeks. If you are planning to vote in person for the PCC election, you MUST present an acceptable form of picture ID. A list of acceptable ID documents is on the South Cambs web site here: https://www.scambs.gov.uk/your-council-and-democracy/elections/voter-id

A428 Upgrade

Most of you will have noticed the A428 upgrade between Black Cat Roundabout and Caxton Gibbet has started in earnest. National Highways is making progress on the new Roxton Road bridge and the free flowing link between the A421 eastbound carriageway and the A1 northbound carriageway. Early work to build the new 10-mile A421 dual carriageway as part of the improvements scheme will start in April, followed by work at Eltisley and Caxton Gibbet around May.

The famous Black Cat statue was removed from the roundabout and stored safely in a new temporary home (one of National Highways site offices). It will be replaced once all work is complete.

White Ribbon

South Cambs DC has now signed up with the White Ribbon organisation. White Ribbon's mission is to end male violence against women once and for all. Zero Carbon Communities grant scheme

The popular Zero Carbon Communities (ZCC) grant scheme enters its sixth year and reopens for applications on Tuesday 2nd April. Last year, the total grants given through the scheme since it began topped more than half a million pounds.

The scheme underscores the Council's commitment to being green to its core and encourages residents, community groups and parish councils to find ways to reduce carbon emissions and raise awareness to meet the climate challenge.

Applications are invited under two themes:

- •Reducing carbon emissions or locking up carbon.
- •Community engagement around climate change.

Grants of between £2,000 and £15,000 are available to community groups and parish councils in the District, with a total pot of £125,000 available. Previous funded projects have included community building retrofits, solar panel installation, food waste reduction, climate-friendly cooking education, and e-bike rental schemes.
